Demountables on the move...

The last demountable classroom was removed from the school oval on Friday. When they arrived in 2015 to accommodate the growing student population and first Year 7 intake some members of the community were concerned. However, the rooms were always a temporary solution and have served as well equipped, air conditioned and spacious classrooms. With our new builds in Science and Mathematics we can now fully cater for all students. The recent addition of Bob Hawke College and restructure of Churchlands SHS intake boundaries have resulted in reduced student numbers and therefore the need for less general learning areas. The demountable classrooms will now be utilised at other schools in WA with at least one on its way to Paraburdoo. Thank you to our Associate Principal of operations Ms Deb Hoy for re rooming the timetable to allow for the demountables to be removed this year.

Formative Assessment - Example 12

Year 7 Science – Ms Leah Anthony

In Year 7 Science students learn about the interdependence of organisms in ecosystems. Students need to create and interpret food webs. The following formative assessment involved students getting clues to generate their own food web. Once completed individually they formed groups to discuss and compare their work, providing each other with feedback and making amendments to ensure that their food web incorporated each clue. As the teacher I observed the students to ascertain their level of understanding of this key concept.

Ocean Food Web Clues Challenge

- · Phytoplankton are the main producers in the ocean ecosystem.
- · Zooplankton are the primary consumers of phytoplankton.
- · Krill feed on smaller organisms such as phytoplankton and zooplankton.
- Krill are eaten by many organisms, including fish, blue whales, penguins and squid.
- · Fish are the prey of herring gulls and tiger sharks.
- · Leopard seals hunt penguins and fish.
- · Zooplankton are eaten by krill and fish.
- · Tiger sharks are carnivores, feeding on various fish and sea birds.
- · Killer whales have many prey, including seals and penguins.
- · Tiger sharks and killer whales are apex predators.
