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Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education Why it is important?

We all want our students to get a great education and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school every day.

If students miss school regularly, they miss learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a student misses puts them behind and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.

What the law says?

Under Western Australian law (*School Education Act 1999*), all children must attend school up until they are 16 years old. 16 and 17 year olds must be enrolled in school or a training organisation, be employed or be in a combination of school/training/employment.

Parents and/or Guardians must send their children to school unless:

- they are too unwell
- they have an infectious disease
- the principal is provided with a genuine and acceptable reason

You must let the school know within three days why your child is not attending.

At Churchlands Senior High School you must call your child's Year Level Secretary on 9441 1700 or send a note in your child's diary to explain the absence.

You should arrange social occasions such as shopping trips and birthday celebrations out of school hours. Holidays should be arranged during school holiday periods.

What happens when your child misses school without a valid reason?

The following steps will be taken until the issue is resolved:


- Your school will ask you for an explanation
- Your school will meet with you to discuss ongoing issues and plan a response
- Your case will be referred to the North Metropolitan Regional Education Office
- A School Attendance Panel may be set up to review the steps taken and provide advice
- You may be fined

Support and help for families

If your child is reluctant or refuses to go to school, or is missing school without you knowing, there is support and help available. Contact your child's House Coordinator or Head of Year for information.


Formative Assessment: Learning Intentions and Success Criteria English Example

Reminder: Learning intentions are used to describe the things that we want our students to learn and success criteria describe the criteria that we use to judge whether the learning activities in which we engaged our students were successful.









One way to share success criteria is to use a rubric to show students what success looks like as they progress.

In this example a staff member in English has collated success criteria into a rubric for Year 7s to use when developing a short story. The images selected at the top of the rubric reflect the developmental nature of the

Rubrics like this one can be used by staff, individual students or students working with their peers to improve their work anytime they are writing a short story. They put the focus on learning, illustrating that the point is not to get it all right straight away but to grow their understanding and skills incrementally.

Students are therefore encouraged to take ownership of their learning and respond to such tasks in a more resilient manner.
