

- Pathway recommendations are made in reference to NAPLAN, OLNA and school achievement data. Course prerequisites are made based on achievement in Year 10.
- To achieve the best possible outcome the aim is to guide all students into the correct pathway and courses at the commencement of Year 11. Enrolled in the right pathway and course for the two year journey of Senior School provides the bet possible opportunity for success.
- Both pathways can provide an opportunity for University entry.

WACE REQUIREMENTS

Breadth and Depth	Choose at least 1 course from List A and List B courses in Year 12
Literacy and Numeracy Requirements	Meet the Literacy and Numeracy standards through NAPLAN or OLNA as well as complete four units of English, two in Year 12.
Achievement Standard	Achieve a minimum of 14 C grades in Year 11 and 12 (or equivalents) including at least 6 C Grades in Year 12 Units (or equivalents).
Course / Endorsed Program Completion	Complete a minimum of 20 units (or equivalents) including a minimum of 10 Year 12 units (or equivalents). This includes sitting the Examinations invigilated by SCSA for all ATAR Courses.

ATAR(Direct) Pathway

- The pathway for students who wish to enter University directly after Year 12 through the calculation of an ATAR.
- Historically around 60% of Churchlands SHS students complete an ATAR pathway.
- The academic requirements of ATAR courses are of a high level and course difficulty increases from Year 11 to Year 12. Students must have demonstrated the academic ability to achieve success in the ATAR pathway by the end of Year 10.
- Course prerequisites have been set by the Heads of each Learning Area. As the content experts they believe this is the achievement needed to be successful in each particular course.
- If you have not met the prerequisites for at least 50% of your intended ATAR courses you will be required to have a course counselling interview.

ATAR(Direct) Pathway

ATAR Course Selection

- Highly recommended to select a minimum of 5 ATAR courses.
- 6th course can be a Certificate or General course.
- Must choose ATAR English, EALD or Literature.
- Must select at least one List B course
- WACE examination are compulsory if you do not sit the external exam the course is removed from your statement of results. This can impact the achievement of WACE

University Entrance

- Must achieve WACE
- Meet any course prerequisites
- Must meet English competence in general this is a final scaled score of 50.
- Involves the calculation of an ATAR; this uses the final result from the top four courses in Year 12 after statistical moderation processes. Students need to meet the minimum ATAR for their desired university course.






Figure 1: Completion rates (any year) for commencing domestic bachelor students over a nine-year period¹


Blended Pathway

- The pathway for students who might be considering University at some stage in the future. There are pathways that provide direct entry after Year 12.
- Interested in further training e.g. TAFE, College of Electrical Training, Motor Trades Association.
- Wanting to enter the workforce.
- Historically around 40% of Churchlands SHS students complete a blended pathway.

Blended Pathway

Blended course selection

- Students select 6 subjects, a combination of General courses and Certificate courses (a maximum of 2 Certificates).
- Can include a maximum of 3 ATAR if the prerequisites have been met.
- Must include English or EALD.
- Must include a List B course.
- Work place Learning is an option.
- Select courses or Certificates that provide skills and knowledge towards your future career: Childcare – Children, Family and the Community Hospitality Industry – Certificate II in Hospitality
- Choose courses you enjoy and that you are likely to be successful in.



University Entrance – Blended Pathway




Figure 2: Share of applicants receiving an offer by ATAR band – 2014 to 2017³

University Entrance – Blended Pathway

Portfolio pathway

• Curtin, Edith Cowan and Murdoch have a portfolio option that provides a pathway into a range of undergraduate degrees. The requirements vary for each university but students do not require an ATAR.

University enabling programs

• Curtin, Edith Cowan, Murdoch and Notre Dame offer enabling programs. These are available for students that successfully complete Year 12 (achieve their WACE). They provide entry into a range of undergraduate degrees. Most enabling programs are free.

Completion of a Certificate IV

- Curtin, Murdoch, Edith Cowan and Notre Dame provide a pathway into some courses with the completion of a Certificate IV. Different universities have different requirements, it's important to check with each university.
- Training providers offer a range of Certificate IV courses with the most common pathway involving students completing the relevant Certificate III.
- Certificate IV in Business is a 2 year Certificate course is an option in Senior School.

Certificate courses

- Certificate courses are an option for students in the ATAR pathway and Blended pathway.
- Certificate courses are nationally recognised industry qualifications delivered either:
 - On school site by appropriately qualified staff (auspiced);or
 - Offsite delivery at a Registered Training Organisation through an application process (Profile)
- Certificate courses aim at developing career specific employability skills and knowledge.
- Successful completion provide 'C' grade equivalents toward WACE achievement. A Certificate II provides 2 'C' grade equivalents for Year 11 and 12.
- Can lead to alternative entry into university.
- Applications for Profile courses open beginning of Term 3 All Vet in Schools opportunities will be advertised via email and will be subject to an application process (resume, cover letter and possible interview/testing).
 An application does not guarantee an offer!

Certificate courses

- Regularly check emails all apprenticeship / traineeship / employment opportunities will be communicated through email. Our VET Coordinator, Mr Tim Morton will also promote application dates and closing dates for courses via email.
- All external courses are located by going to SEQTA Student One Drive Senior Schooling VET Mr Morton - 2023
- If a student is looking to apply for an external qualification they must first have a meeting and discuss with VET Coordinator. They must complete an External Qualification Application Form (found in the student one drive). In this meeting prerequisites for the course will be discussed along with alignment the student's aspirations and ensures parents and students are aware of the extra workload involved. It is also required to ensure parents are aware of the payment required, if it is a Fee For Service course. It also allows the VET Coordinator to ensure continued support for the student, keep track of which students have applied for which courses, what days students are out of school and where they are located, and to ensure they are keeping up with their work.
- 1. Applications for 2023 TAFE courses will open in September and will close in December. Many FFS courses have already opened applications for 2023.

Students participate in 2 Industry Placements during the Exam Period. Successful completion provides 'C grade' equivalents towards WACE.



- Please support your child to choose suitable subjects, they are more likely to achieve good results in their final years of school.




