



MEET WACE REQUIREMENTS



WACE REQUIREMENTS

Breadth and Depth	Choose at least 1 course from List A and List B courses in Year 12
Literacy and Numeracy Requirements	Meet the Literacy and Numeracy standards through NAPLAN or OLNA as well as complete four units of English, two in Year 12.
Achievement Standard	Achieve a minimum of 14 C grades in Year 11 and 12 (or equivalents) including at least 6 C Grades in Year 12 Units (or equivalents).
Course / Endorsed Program Completion	Complete a minimum of 20 units (or equivalents) including a minimum of 10 Year 12 units (or equivalents). This includes sitting the Examinations invigilated by SCSA for all ATAR Courses.

MEET WACE REQUIREMENTS

OLNA

- There 2 opportunities each calendar year with programs in place to support students to meet the requirements

Achievement Standard

- Students should aim to achieve a minimum of 8 'C' Grades at the completion of Year 11, if they do not, achievement of WACE is at risk
- A grade is awarded for each semester of a course. It's important to note that all courses in Senior School are year-long, the grade awarded at the end of the semester is the grade given to **both** semesters.
- Successful completion of a Certificate II is equivalent to two C grades in Year 11 and two C grades in Year 12 (even if it's a one year Certificate)
 - A C-grade equivalent will be applied for the pair of units in a Year 12 ATAR course by the Authority where a student has achieved a D grade and also achieved a moderated written school mark or ATAR course written examination mark at or above a specified cut point of approximately 40.
- A Certificate III and IV is equivalent to two C grades in Year 11 and 4 C grades in Year 12
- Work place learning is an endorsed program. For every 55 hours of work place learning (with completed documentation) a C grade equivalent is awarded
- No more than 4 C grade equivalents can be award in each year (Certificates, work place learning, other endorsed programs)

- On track to achieve WACE
- Completed the minimum 55 hours, skills journal and logbook for each work placement, therefore achieved 2 C grade equivalents.
- If the Certificate is completed in Year 12, they will accrue an additional 2 C grades equivalents in Year 11 and Year 12

ATAR(Direct) Pathway

Australian Tertiary Admission Rank

- The pathway for students who wish to enter University directly after Year 12 through the calculation of an ATAR.
- Historically around 60% of Churchlands SHS students complete an ATAR pathway.
- WACE examinations are compulsory – if you do not sit the external exam the course is removed from your statement of results. This can impact the achievement of WACE
- Meet any course prerequisites

ATAR(Direct) Pathway

- Must meet English competence
 - English competency requirements vary greatly between universities
 - **UWA** Final scaled score of 50 or more in ATAR English/Literature/ESL
 - **Curtin** Final scaled score of 50 or more in ATAR English/Literature/ESL
 - **or**
 - ATAR English Grade C
 - **or**
 - General English Grade A
 - **ECU** Grade C in ATAR English/Literature/ESL
 - **or**
 - General English Grade A
 - **Murdoch** achievement of WACE
 - **Notre Dame** achievement of WACE
- Involves the calculation of an ATAR; this uses the final result from the top four courses in Year 12 after statistical moderation processes. Students need to meet the minimum ATAR for their desired university course.





Early Offers

- Currently Universities in Western Australia have an 'Early Offer' process. They access Year 11 end of year results through TISC and generate a predicted ATAR.
- Different Universities have different conditions for the Early Offer process it's important to research each University.
- This is becoming an increasingly popular process for students. It can alleviate some of the stress, particularly moving into the WACE exams. Highlights the importance of making good course choices in Year 11. Choosing courses that are too challenging can result in a low predicted ATAR and reduce the chance of receiving an early offer.
- Nearly all early offers have conditions in place.

University Entrance – Blended Pathway

Portfolio pathway

- Curtin, Edith Cowan and Murdoch have a portfolio option that provides a pathway into a range of undergraduate degrees. The requirements vary for each university but students do not require an ATAR. UWA offers an Experienced Based Entry pathway that is similar

Tertiary Preparation Program

- Curtin, Edith Cowan, Murdoch and Notre Dame offer enabling programs. These are available for students that successfully complete Year 12 (achieve their WACE). They provide entry into a range of undergraduate degrees. Most enabling programs are free.

Completion of a Certificate IV

- All Universities provide a pathway into some courses with the completion of a Certificate IV. Different universities have different requirements, it's important to check with each university.
- Training providers offer a range of Certificate IV courses with the most common pathway involving students completing the relevant Certificate III.

Curtin University Tertiary Preparation Program - UniReady

- This is an option in Year 12 at Churchlands SHS.
- It is aimed at students that have a predicted ATAR below 70 or students that have demonstrated success in at least one ATAR course
- If students successfully complete the program, they receive entry into a range of courses at Curtin University.
- Other Universities may accept students that have successfully completed the UniReady program.
- It replaces two courses in Year 12 and is run within the timetable by Churchlands staff on school site.
- There is an application process that looks at students' achievement and attendance as part of the entry requirements. Student must have achieved a C grade in at least one ATAR course in Year 11.
- The application process will open early next term once ATAR students have received their predicted ATAR

ENDORSED PROGRAMS

Workplace Learning

Students participate in 2 Industry Placements during the Exam Period. Successful completion provides 'C grade' equivalents towards WACE.

Duke of Edinburgh

Run through our Community Service Program. Students achieve this award through learning a new skill, improving well being, volunteering in the community and experience an adventure in a new environment





Subject Selection Online opens End of Term 2

SSO opens for selection of Year 12 courses. Parents and students use SSO to complete their course selections. Most families will be able to do this online, but individual counselling sessions will also be available during week two of term 3.

Predicted ATAR

Student should receive their predicted ATAR before course selection closes. Important information to consider when considering options for 2027

Course Counselling


Anyone can book a course counselling session. This is done through SSO Online. Any student that has not met the prerequisites for at least three of their five ATAR courses ***will be required to have a course counselling interview.***

- Please support your child to choose suitable subjects, they are more likely to achieve good results in their final years of school.


In the final years of school, your child should choose subjects that:

- A timetable is created
 - *Most students will get the subjects they have selected.*
 - *If there is a clash, or a subject doesn't run, then a reserve will be used*
- The timetable is staffed

 - *We will still check students have met the Prerequisite*
- Encourage your children to do their research
 - *Speak to their teachers*
 - *The 2025 Course Outlines are on the Student OneDrive*
- Students cannot change after Term 1, this is a Curriculum Authority deadline.

Equitable Access to Assessments (EAAs)

ATAR courses

- Please inform Learning Support of any new diagnoses as soon possible after diagnosis
- Older diagnoses will need to be reviewed prior to year 12. Learning Support will be in touch throughout the year.
- EAAs apply to timed class-based assessments
- English ATAR course – most EAAs students will sit assessments during year 11 program, Thursday p5.
- Year 11 Student Profiles are reviewed in semester 2, at Parent-Teacher interviews.
- Year 12, SCSA applications close during term 1. Important to get diagnostic documents in, in a timely manner to Jane Price.

Key Messages

- Achievement of WACE is the number one priority, select courses in Year 12 that place you on a pathway to success
- Current achievement and level of application is a strong indicator of success in the ATAR pathway
- For students entering university directly after Year 12, your ATAR is a good predictor of degree completion and therefore success
- There is a range of rich skills, knowledge and capabilities obtained through various means after Year 12 that can increase success in university studies
- There are many pathways into university and alternative pathways are becoming increasingly common
