










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Hello Everyone!

ormative Assessment

Formative Assessment: Eliciting Evidence of Learning

Eliciting evidence of learning is one of the five key strategies used in the implementation of formative assessment. This strategy involved teachers using planned practices to collect information to establish where students are in their learning and using this to inform the next step. Below is a list of some of the technique's teachers can use to elicit evidence of learning through formative assessments:

Exit Tickets

Students respond to a brief question or prompt at the end of a lesson or class, summarising what they have learned or asking any lingering questions.

No Hands Up

The No Hands Up strategy for eliciting evidence of learning involves using random selection methods to promote equal participation. By fostering accountable talk and creating an inclusive environment, it ensures that every student feels empowered to actively engage and demonstrate their understanding.

Think-Pair-Share

Students think individually about a question or problem, discuss their thoughts with a partner, and then share their ideas with the whole class. This technique allows the teacher to assess individual understanding and promote peer learning.

Teacher Questioning

Teachers ask thought-provoking questions during lessons to assess students' understanding, prompt critical thinking, and gauge their depth of knowledge. Different types of questions can be used to encourage them to articulate their reasoning and demonstrate their learning.

Quick Quizzes or Polls

Teachers administer brief quizzes or polls using technology tools or hand-held response systems to gather real-time feedback on student understanding. This helps teachers make immediate instructional adjustments.

One-on-One Conferences

Teachers hold individual conferences with students to discuss their progress, address questions, and provide targeted feedback based on their understanding and performance.

These formative assessment techniques allow teachers to continuously monitor student progress, identify areas of strength and weakness, and adjust instruction to meet students' needs effectively. By gathering evidence of learning in real-time, teachers can make informed decisions to enhance the learning experience and promote student growth.

Dear parents, guardians and carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- . consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational
 outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information.
