

This was made possible from using funds from our hot chocolate machine! So thanks students.




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'Socks for the Homeless 2022'

The value of a pair of socks is way more than the price: Homeless people struggle to find clean dry socks to wear. As a result, they can develop both trench foot and warm water immersion foot. A homeless person with a history of this is eight times more likely to die in the next five years compared with a person, who is not homeless.

How you can help? Donate socks - preferably new adult socks in natural fibres (cotton or wool).

This is a great project for our school as it is quite easy for students to donate socks.

Just \$5 will buy two pairs of socks.

Formative Assessment Science Example 1

In term 2 the school will share information with you about Formative Assessment practices.

The purpose of this communication is intended that parents and caregivers gain a better understanding of the different elements of the Formative Assessment Info-graphic and Formative Assessment when in practice.

Example One - Year 12 Chemistry - Kym Lucchesi

Each day for Year 12 Chemistry I outline the learning intentions and success criteria in their daily lesson outline in OneNote. An example appears below.

Tuesday - 1/3

Learning Intentions - What you are learning about

Use chemistry terms and equations to identify and describe acids and bases.

Success Criteria - What you should be able to do by the end of this lesson.

- Outline how the definition of acids and bases has changed from Davy to Arrhenius and then Bronsted-Lowry.
- · Use the Bronsted -Lowry theory to define the terms acids and bases.
- Identify acids and bases conjugate pairs in chemical equations.
- Identify the link between an acid and its conjugate base, (and base and conjugate acid).

Guide Dogs WA we have recently launched the very first Western Australian Guide Dog Breeding Program and are searching for Volunteer Puppy Raisers!

Puppy Raisers provide the very first homes for future Guide Dogs, Autism Assistance Dogs, Therapy Dogs and Court Dogs.

Puppy Raisers welcome an 8 week old puppy into their home and with support, spend approximately 12 months introducing the puppy to the environments and experiences they will encounter as a working dog. They also teach the young pup basic obedience and socialisation.

We have found that many of our current Puppy Raisers are families with school aged children so we are reaching out in the hope you may be able to help us spread the word.
