From the Principal

Early in March 2020 the world woke to the seriousness of the Coronavirus pandemic. Initially thought of as "not a serious problem" it has now grown to be the factor in excess of 300,000 deaths together with global economic recession. It has been a disaster of immense magnitude, however we in Australia and even more so in Western Australia have been spared the global magnitude of this once in a hundred year event. We were fortunate in many ways; our isolation, the population of our cities though large, exhibit nowhere near the densities of comparable cities in Europe, North and South America and Asia. We were also thankful for the speedy reactions of both our Federal and State Governments in closing borders and implementing a range of safe practices.

This was a most challenging time for all in the community, particularly you as parents with the concerns you have for loved ones, not only those vulnerable due to their age or pre-existing conditions, but mostly for your own children. I also recognised that many of my teachers and support staff were clearly showing signs of anxiety as they too had school age children. Some were also of a certain age or they or their partner had a significant underlying health problem leaving them more susceptible to the virus. For us in schools, we had to plan and act so that your children's health and education was our greatest concern and the focus of our efforts. To say it was a challenging time is perhaps an understatement, but now as we slowly regain normality it provides an opportunity to



retrace how we as school staff worked with you to reach where we are today.

On Monday 16 March, the Education Department first flagged that schools would need to be ready to address a new challenge confronting us, nobody yet understood its impact and severity. From a personal view point I had already booked flights at that time to be interstate on Long Service Leave, however Karena Shearing filled in as Principal and did a marvellous job. On my return with three weeks left of the term, the situation constantly unfolded with the school requiring to be agile with its responses, with communication with parents and with planning for the future. By the end of term, the consensus was that no child would be physically at school during Term 2 and the school and teachers planned accordingly. Online lessons were developed, Microsoft Teams and OneNote became the 'go to' technologies for staff, many of whom worked through their holidays to be ready to go on day one. We now know that the Government made a decision that schools were safe to open and accommodate all students from the start of Term 2. Since then we have gradually moved into normal operations. Hopefully next term group sizes can be expanded to include all of our staff and whole year groups together. We will wait and see.

The Churchlands Senior High School Board has worked diligently on behalf of our community to implement its charter while at the same time being innovative in its approach. Mr John Gillon, Head boy in 1968, has been a member of the Board since 2012 and Chair of the Board for the last six years. He has decided to step down from that role as of the end of Term 2, 2020. Mr Gillon has been a wonderful member of the Board bringing legal expertise and business acumen to the role. He will always be remembered for his work in establishing the Churchlands Foundation which is responsible for funding the 400K watt solar project at the school. We thank him for his contribution and he will be sorely missed.

It certainly has been an interesting year!

The COVID-19 situation resulted in a lot of uncertainty and initial disruption, particularly towards the end of Term 1. It was great that we could resume school back in Term 2 in a version of normality! The attendance rates for our Year 11 and 12 students were excellent, hovering around 95% each day and the recently completed exams went very smoothly and even showed a reduction in students affected by illness and other issues compared to 2019! At the time of writing we are still not able to hold assemblies or Parent Information evenings but this may well change in the near future.

Course Selections for 2021

Year 11 students need to be thinking about how things have gone this year, particularly after the exams, and what courses they might choose for Year 12 next year. Students and parents will be given access to a PowerPoint covering the key information that is normally communicated each year regarding subject selection. It is very important that students meet the prerequisites for a Year 12 course to have a reasonable chance of success. Past history shows that the majority of students who don't meet the prerequisite for a subject generally struggle to achieve and place themselves under significant stress in managing their workload. This can even exacerbate mental health issues.

This year we will again be using the Subject Selection Online (SSO) website to manage this process. More information will be given to students and emailed to parents before the end of term. The Year 12 Course Selection Handbook is now available from our website under "Curriculum" and "Senior Schooling". Students and parents should note that students should achieve a minimum of two "C" grades or better by the end of the year if they hope to succeed at Year 12 level.

Year 10 students have been working with Mrs Slodecki on their transition program in preparation for choosing courses for Year 11 next year. They worked earlier in the year on a program which has helped focus them on future careers and directions. In addition, they have received a copy of the Subject Selection Booklet and participated in individual class seminars with Mrs Slodecki. Parents will also be given access to a PowerPoint covering the key information that is normally communicated each year regarding subject selection.

As with the Year 11s, this year we will again be using the Subject Selection Online (SSO) program to manage this process. More information will be emailed to parents before the end of term. The Year 11 Subject Selection Booklet is now available from our website under "Curriculum" and "Senior Schooling".

Please note that subjects in both Year 11 and Year 12 are "year-long" and there are no subject changes possible after Term 1 of 2021.


Year 12 Breakfast Club




Associate Principal Middle School

This term we are videoing our assemblies and they will be delivered in class, Year 10 students will see my speech, delivered on horseback, with the overall theme being about working together to get back on the horse. I believe this message is important, and that together we can support each other and get back to playing sport, reengage in the arts or cultural activities. We are now getting back on track, Year 10 students have just completed their invigilated assessments, with all students taking the assessments seriously, and working hard to do their very best. Our Year 10 students are now looking through the Subject Selection Booklet as they begin their journey to track and plan what senior secondary school will look like and the educational pathway they will choose.



Year 9 students are starting to also think about what next year will hold for them and are starting to learn more about pathways and choosing courses for 2021. During class time Year 9 students watched a presentation on Year 10 course options,

and they, along with their parents will be using Subject Selection Online to choose their courses, this will be open from 22 July, and close on 31 July. The Year 9 and 10 Subject Selection Handbook is available on the school website ready for students and parents to look through, with plenty of time to make their choices.

Lunch times have been very busy, with a huge turnout of students in the knitting club, it has been wonderful to hear how middle secondary students have engaged with the program and how they are mentoring younger students. Equally exciting is the work being done by the Year 10 peer support group who are mentoring Year 7 students.

Year 9 students are working hard to prepare for sitting Year 9 OLNA next term, which is new for them. The Year 9 OLNA will give students an extra chance to sit the test, with the likelihood of large numbers of students passing, meaning they will be on track to achieve their WACE without the worry of sitting OLNA again. OLNA information for Year 9 students has gone out, with further communications to follow early next term.

I have been getting out and visiting classes, and several weeks ago I had the chance to go and watch the Year 10 specialist swimming students play ultimate frisbee. It was incredibly impressive to see the student leadership, and the camaraderie within the group. I know the students will be very happy to get back into our newly renovated swimming pool and change rooms.

Overall, I am so proud of the Year 9 and 10 cohort, and I look forwarding to reviewing the Semester 1 results, I am sure I will be very impressed with the student results, as I know just how hard they have been working.


Subject Selection Online (SSO) process for choosing Year 11 Courses

Library Announcement



Dear parents, guardians and carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified—the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. Students presented their findings in a poster with the top three being awarded prizes.


The top three pieces of work were produced by: Urvi Patel, Alastair Woolfitt and Rhianna Keating.

Urvi's poster was then chosen to be put forward into the national GAWA Geographical competition.




Some dedicated students produced outstanding exhibits despite the event not going ahead as planned. These students have been recognised for their commitment and enthusiasm. These include




The Arts Drama


