

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Strike A Chord

To celebrate their 75th anniversary, Musica Viva organised the *Strike A Chord* chamber music competition. A total of 103 student ensembles around Australia entered the inaugural competition, including three from Churchlands Senior High School. With the help of Jarrad Jenkins and Mrs Hawksworth, the chamber groups were able to record a live performance for the adjudicators and an audience made up of the Year 10 music students, parents, and special guests Mr Chapman, Mr Siwek and Mr Cross.

The first group to perform were the Year 12 Wind Quintet, consisting of Emily Chappell, Cassie Tyres, Elise Gardner, Rebecca Hong, and Cintia D'Cress. The group wowed the audience by playing a piece by Malcolm Arnold, an exciting and original arrangement of the traditional *"What will we do with a drunken sailor"*. Congratulations to this group who won the Wind Quintet category. As a result, this chamber group was selected to participate in a national teacher's conference workshop via video link, where teachers learned how to tutor a chamber group.

Next up were the amazing Year 11 Oboe Quartet comprising of Aiden Labuschagne, Zoe Hawksworth, Bella Wong and Hannah Clark. Their interpretation of the first movement of Mozart's Oboe Quartet was extremely sensitive and musical and their ensemble skills and teamwork were evident in their fantastic playing.

Last but not least was the Year 10 Mozart Trio, playing the first movement of the Kegelstatt Trio. The chamber group, including Xin Ze Cai, Alice Hawksworth and Sarah Chappell, tried to create a scene inspired by the title of the piece, Kegelstatt, meaning an 18th century bowling alley. I'm sure all the participants learned so much from this experience, including how to be in a small ensemble, musicality, the style of the piece and balance of parts just to name a few. Lastly, all this would not have been possible if not for the ensemble directors, Ms Griffin, Mrs Cahill, Ms Arkley-Smith and Mr Neil Barclay who helped us immensely, to play to the standard that we did.

REMINDER TO PARENTS


