From the Principal



As this academic year draws to a close, I look forward to 2024 and the security in my belief that Churchlands SHS will commence the year with a full complement of teaching staff. Not only do I anticipate this but I am just as confident that the quality of our teachers will continue to be of the highest order.

Why do I start with this statement? The simple reason is that there will be many Principals who currently will not have the same security and confidence that I have in completing their full staffing requirements to commence next year. My country colleagues and Principals in lower socioeconomic areas will be most at risk in finding sufficiently competent teachers to staff their schools.

This is not just a Western Australian schools problem but a challenge for all Australian School Principals as we approach the start of 2024. While I hope this is not the case, I firmly believe that this will remain a problem for some years to come unless we can reduce the burnout of our teachers caused by workload, student behaviour, mental health and well-being packaged with unsatisfactory salary compensation.

Quality teaching requires the unpacking and delivery of some of the most complex behaviours, interactions and processes to ensure a successful lesson. At Churchlands we have developed and now adopted our Quality Teaching and Learning Framework (QT&LF), which is an attempt to provide our teachers with a consistent structure around their daily lessons. It incorporates the best research around lesson design and employs instructional tactics and strategies to maximise the engagement of students to produce the best possible learning outcomes. Like Formative Assessment, you will hear much more about our progress in implementing the Churchlands OT&LF.

Congratulations

I wish to extend my congratulations to Karena Shearing who won a Principal position at the commencement of Term 4. Likewise congratulations to Matt Baltovich who has won a Deputy Principal position for 2024, and to Dr Kym Tan who has also won a Deputy Principal's position for Semester 1 next year.

Churchlands Staff Movements

We welcome the appointment of Mr Aaron Carroll to the Head of Year 7 who comes to us from Perth Modern School. Internally we have created a new position and appointed Ms Jane Price as the fixed

term Program Coordinator Disability Support, a position which will be advertised statewide early next year.

Kym Lucchesi has been appointed for six months as Program Coordinator Teaching and Learning, replacing Dr Kym Tan. Christi Collins will replace Chris Van Maanen as Head of Learning Area: Physical Education, who will be on Long Service Leave in Term 1 next year. Sharon Andrews has been appointed Head of Learning Area: The Arts replacing Tracey Baker who is on Long Service Leave Term 1 next year.

I am pleased to say that our enrolments appear to have developed a pattern of predictability, which enables the school to accurately predict teacher requirements thus forecast our budgets. Next year we expect student numbers to approximate 2390.

Our Workplace Learning students completed their two weeks of work experience during the schools examination period gaining invaluable insight into varying careers and employment pathways. Successful completion of Workplace Learning contributes towards achievement of WACE and many students gain part time employment or an apprenticeship through this process.



As I look back on my first year in Junior Secondary, I reflect on the immense pride I have for our Year 7 and 8 students. Both cohorts have constantly demonstrated such strength of character and maturity that I sometimes have to be reminded of their young age.

Our Year 7 students started this year as a mature and confident group of young people, who showed that the government's movement of Year 7 students to high school was in fact the right decision. Our Year 7 students showed their high school readiness by their organisation, leadership and positive attitude towards school.

Our Year 8 students showed some of best friendship skills I have seen, with a number of instances coming to mind where we saw students coming together to look after one another with such care and respect it disguised their age.

Earlier this term we selected some 80 students across Junior Secondary to participate in a special leadership excursion delivered by Teamworks Australia. During these excursions our staff were able to see the problem solving, leadership and team work skills our students have. Students worked together to solve complex problems, connected with students not normally in their friendship groups and overall demonstrated the true Churchlands spirit.

This term saw our Junior Secondary students engage in a number of events including interschool athletics, concerts, art exhibitions and excursions. During these events I constantly heard back from staff and community members of the high standards of behaviour our students have consistently demonstrated.

Two weeks ago we welcomed a group of 370 Year 6 students to our school for our high school orientation program, again over these two days our Year 8 student leaders took the reins and helped to organise the Year 6 students during break times, assisting with lunch, handing out snacks and checking in with students.

At the end of year assemblies I gave some challenges to our Junior students to consider over their Christmas holiday break. Whilst our students have learnt many valuable lessons in the classroom this year I challenged them, that over the break, they widen their knowledge base, look after their wellbeing and change themselves.

My challenge to students is:

- 1. Get outside. Get into nature, get dirty and muddy. Take your shoes off.
- 2. Move, be active. Walk the stairs, play sports and get active.

- 3. Experience gratitude and be thankful for what you have.
- 4. Look after one another, the value in our humanity is how we treat each other.
- 5. Give things ago. If you fail that is okay, failure is a part of learning.
- 6. Be truly you. You must always be completely true to yourself. Don't pretend to be anyone else other than your absolute authentic self.
- Challenge the norm, just because something 7. has always been that way doesn't mean it has to keep being that way.
- 8. Set goals and work to achieve them.
- 9. Celebrate the achievements of others.
- 10. Speak up, both for yourself and for others.
- 11. Care for the environment, its your environment, the one you and your future family will live in. Treat it with care and respect.
- 12. Ask questions and be curious, look for the right questions to ask...find answers in unusual places, ask the tough questions, and always have an open mind. Think for yourself. Investigate opportunities, be creative with your solutions.
- 13. Respect the umpire. Whether it's at school, on the sporting field, at work, if you are pulled over by the police. Respect the umpire always.
- 14. Be kind and polite to the cashier, the customer service staff, the person taking your food order. They work long tough hours, they put up with a lot. Always thank them, always be polite.
- 15. Give disabled people a go. Say hello, create space, be kind, be thoughtful and give disabled people a voice.
- 16. Listen...Don't listen to reply, truly listen.
- 17. Make decisions with integrity.
- 18. Challenge perceptions. Be bold. There is no script.

I can't wait to meet our new Year 7 students next year, but also am farewelling my wonderful Year 8 students. Over the past year I have watched them grow and develop and ready themselves for life in Middle Secondary. I will still be watching them closely, popping into classes and hopefully hearing good stories about their ongoing achievements.

Music **Tribute to Mr Paul Sealey**

Over the years, Paul was involved in many aspects of the Music program, conducting all the string ensembles, from Tutti to Symphony Orchestra and directed all the choirs from the Year 7s Dooverlackies through to Senior Choir & Chorale. As well as the performances at Churchlands SHS, the ensembles Paul directed also performed at the IMSS showcase concert, Opus, the combined Perth Modern/Churchlands concerts at The Quarry, and at St Joseph's in Subiaco.

A highlight in the School of Music calendar has always been the overseas tours and Paul went on five of these travelling through Austria, the United Kingdom, Austria, the onited kingdom, Ireland, France, Belgium, the Czech Republic & North America. He also travelled to Italy to personally choose the wonderful Fazioli grand piano which has pride of place in the Taryn Fiebig Concert Hall.

Paul was recognised as a skilled classroom practitioner and achieved Level 3 Classroom Teacher status after a rigorous application process in 2013. He was always prepared to learn and received his Australian Kodaly Certificate in 2018.

The impact Paul had on the students in his classes can be summed up by this comment from a student now studying in Germany: "He made such a monumental impact on my life. I absolutely loved every class I had with him. I cherished his warmth, his unintentional yet brutal roasts, and of course his unbelievable chord analysis skills."

Administratively, over the years included Choir Paul's roles Second-In-Charge, Coordinator, Instrumental Coordinator and when Glenn Robinson was on leave, Paul was the Director of Music.

Apart from his Churchlands responsibilities, he was often asked by other schools to be on their examination panels as a moderator. He also was a presenter for various music teacher associations where his knowledge and experience were shared across the teaching profession. At various stages Paul was on the committee for the Australian National Choral Association (ANCA) and the Kodaly Association here in WA. He was also on the advisory committee at the School Curriculum and Standards Authority. His insights into the Year 11

He came to Churchlands these things he did, his experience and knowledge were from St Hildas as a highly experienced teacher. brought back to our faculty, and we were the better for it.

> The School of Music 40th Anniversary Concert held at the Perth Concert Hall in 2012 was a highlight when Paul conducted the Symphony Orchestra with ALL the music students being in the choir. All choral directors prepared the various choirs to perform excerpts from Carmina Burana. What an amazing sound that filled the Perth Concert Hall that night. And let's not forget hearing the Symphony Orchestra performing with the glorious soprano Taryn Fiebig as the soloist.

> > In the years when the School of Music didn't tour overseas, there were musicals. With colleagues Angela Padley (drama) and Ruth Sutherland (dance), the school was treated to some of the best musicals in the business, Little Shop of Horrors, We Will Rock You, Grease, Fiddler on the Roof and Joseph and the Technicolor Dreamcoat. the Technicolor Dreamcoat. These were staged in the old gymnasium. With the addition of the Taryn Fiebig Concert Hall, the shows got bigger and the standard higher with Les Miserable, Oklahoma, Sweet Charity, The Sound of Music, Wicked, Mamma Mia and Annie. Whilst Paul wasn't able to direct the performances for Annie, he had worked with the students to prepare them for the final rehearsals and the performances that followed. performances that followed.

In recent months, the Churchlands Foundation initiated the Paul Sealey Scholarship, Composition in recognition of Paul's passion for composition. Part of the proposal reads, "the scholarship will allow music students with a keen

interest in composition to access expert specialised tuition and resources beyond the provisions usually available. It is hoped that the recipients will be supported to develop and excel in creative musicmaking, to enrich their own lives and those of others, as Paul has so generously and gladly done all his life."

Paul Sealey sadly passed away in November, but his legacy to music education will continue for many years to come through the Composition Scholarship, the students he has taught, the teachers he has mentored and the many friends he has made throughout his life.



Family and Community Engagement Formative Assessment

Formative Assessment at Churchlands Senior High School

How can Parents Support Students using Formative Assessment?

Parents can play a vital role in helping their child with formative assessment. Here are some ways parents can get involved:.

Organisation and Support

Create a Supportive Environment

Establish a quiet study space at home, provide necessary materials, minimise distractions, and encourage a consistent study routine. Be available to help and answer questions. If they are regularly telling you that they have no homework check with their teacher and/or ask them what study they could do to consolidate the learning in a certain subject.

Check Their Organisation

Ensure your child has the necessary tools and organisational strategies for their schoolwork, both online and offline. The tasks are only useful if they know where they are! Help them set up folders for digital work and a method to keep track of physical materials.

Use Feedback to Guide Support

Pay attention to feedback from formative assessments, discuss it with your child, help them to understand it and work together to develop improvement plans. Ask them some key questions "Where are you going?", "How are you going?" and "Where to next?" If needed, work together to develop a plan based around these questions

Accessing Information

Know What's on SEQTA

Access SEQTA to get information about attendance, assessment dates, results, and student programs. This information can help you set goals, encourage self-reflection, and effective study habits.

Communicate with Teachers

Maintain open communication with your child's teachers. Attend parent-teacher conferences, ask about formative assessment strategies, and seek guidance on how to support your child if academic concerns arise.

Engage with School Information

Stay informed about formative assessment through newsletters, the bytes, social media, and school events. These sources can offer valuable insights and practical tips.

Have conversations with your child about their learning goals. Encourage them to set specific, achievable goals and regularly reflect on their progress. Ask questions that promote selfawareness and motivation

Ask Open-Ended Questions

Encourage reflective thinking by asking questions like "What did you learn from this assignment?" or "What was challenging about the task?"

Encourage Self-Assessment

Help your child learn how to assess their work and identify strengths and areas for improvement. This fosters self-reflection and a growth mindset. Ask key questions such as "What strategies have you been using to ensure you have understood the content in class?" or "What adjustments or changes have you made to your study routine or strategies based on the feedback provided by formative assessments?"


Review Student Work

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




Humanities and Social Sciences Churchlands SHS Mock Trial Team



Meet the 2023 Winner of the Premier's Science Awards Early Career Scientist of the Year category

Last updated: 11 September 2023

The Early Career Scientist of the Year category recognises outstanding scientists who have completed their highest degree within the past 5 years and demonstrated excellence in a field of science, scientific research or technological advancement.

Now in its 22nd year, the Premier's Science Awards recognises and celebrates the outstanding scientific research and engagement taking place in Western Australia.

Meet the winner for the Early Career Scientist of the Year category:



Dr David Gozzard

The University of Western Australia

Dr David Gozzard is an experimental physicist at the University of Western Australia (UWA) developing laser measurement and communication technology for spacecraft. Dr Gozzard previously worked on developing synchronisation technology for the Square Kilometre Array, and is now translating that, and other astronomy technology, to enable robust laser links between the ground and spacecraft that will support high-speed communications and high-precision space science.

Dr Gozzard's research has the potential to make WA a world-leader in satellite communications. He is passionate about both research and science education, and is very active in outreach and teaching at UWA.
