Since 2003, he has overseen the growth of the school from 1250 to its current enrolment of 2800 Neil holds the following principles as critical to his success as a Principal; pastoral care, a rigorous curriculum, the provision of sporting and cultural opportunities and the development of community shared values.

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Neil was one of the 20 principals who went on the intensive world-class leadership development program 'Principal's Fellowship Program' at Harvard University's Graduate School of Education in Boston, USA. Neil is also an active Member of the Principal's Federation of Western Australia.

Neil is highly respected and admired by his staff, colleagues, acquaintances as well as the community. There was an outpouring of praise and gratitude for Neil but even so, words could not encapsulate the successes and positive change he brought to the school during his tenure of service at the school.

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


Paul Housley, current principal

We welcome Neil's successor Paul Housley who will be serving as the Principal, Churchlands Senior High School for the remaining of the year.

Paul commenced his career teaching Mathematics and Science at Jerramungup District High School in 1982. He returned to Perth as a Mathematics teacher the following year where he spent eight years at Kent Street Senior High School before being promoted to Head of Mathematics at Kambalda Senior High School. During this time he spent a semester as Deputy Principal.

Moving back to the city after five years, he further developed his skills as Program Coordinator Administration at Swan View Senior High School and his leadership was acknowledged when he won the Principal role for Semester 1 1998 and Term 3 2000. His career then moved full time into school leadership gaining positions as Deputy Principal at Lockridge Senior High School, Associate Principal at Woodvale Secondary College, Principal Consultant for West Coast District Office and Associate Principal at Churchlands Senior High School since 2011.

In 2005, John was instrumental in the formation of the Churchlands Senior High School Alumni Association, drafting and overseeing the constitution and serving as a Committee Member for several years. He has since brought his skill, experience and business knowledge to the task of establishing the Churchlands Senior High School Foundation, the first organisation of this type for a public school in WA. The Foundation's aim is to support and enrich the school and its students and to set an example by raising the standard of the school facilities and opportunities.

It is through the Foundation that the school is able to grant two Music scholarships annually worth \$4500 each.

John was instrumental in launching the Churchlands Foundation 'Solar Power to Scholarships Project' where the project involves the installation of Photo Voltaic panels at school, which will generate significant savings on electricity costs. Through these savings, John's ultimate aim is to offer more scholarships and opportunities to students and to the school in the areas of sports, academic, Vocational Education and Training (VET), leadership and much more. John will carry on his good work and commitment to the school in his capacity as a Board Member of the Churchlands Foundation.

Churchlands Senior High School has been very fortunate to have a highly skilled and dedicated member on the School Board for a number of years. John has been a steady hand leading a harmonious team, working closely on infrastructure projects and speaking up in important settings about the needs of the school and the community. John has been both wise and virtuous and the school is grateful that he has shared these qualities as a Board Member. On behalf of the Churchlands Senior High School and the community, we would like to express our sincere gratitude for John's service. We wish him all the best.

NIK BAPPOO 2012

Nik Bappoo graduated from Churchlands Senior High School in 2012. Over fifty of our highest achieving Year 12 students and a large number of their parents and staff were priviledged to have him as a guest speaker at the Year 12 Breakfast Club in June 2019. His wealth of knowledge, experience and thoughts certainly inspired and motivated our Year 12s in their pursuit of academic excellence.

Nik Bappoo moved to Australia from Mauritius in 2011 and chose to complete Year 11 and 12 at Churchlands where he was determined to aim high and pursue his dreams.

Nik was a intelligent and outstanding young man and as member of the Breakfast Club back then, he fondly remembers the breakfasts and motivational talks. He went on to UWA and was accepted into the highly competitive Bachelor of Philosophy (Hons) course. Nik managed to combine his love for medical sciences and engineering by pursuing studies in Mechanical Engineering and Pathology and completed his Honours project with the Vascular Engineering Laboratory or VascLab at the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research.

Since then, he has worked in medical innovation including research work involving clinical trials of new technologies, industry work involving medical and surgical 3D printing and is now doing his PhD developing computational models of placental blood flow to predict impaired foetal development.

His work has been extremely well received worldwide and he has received several high calibre international awards, including nearly \$6000 for the Mimics Innovation Award for the Asia-Pacific region in 2017.

Outside of research, Nik holds numerous teaching positions for both high school

programs and university courses. He has also led many non-for-profits such as Teach Learn Grow, addressing inequity in education, and the biomedical engineering society, aiming to bring medical innovators together and empower them to share their brilliant ideas to create a healthier and more equitable world.

Nik attributes his success to his dedication to following his passions while maintaining a life-work balance, adopting a growth mindset and building meaningful relationships along the way. He has certainly achieved a lot in the eight years since he left Churchlands!

LYNDON DA CRUZ 1981

Pormer DUX of the Year in 1981 Professor Lyndon da Cruz was awarded the 2020 'Australian of the Year Great Britain' on Australia Day celebrated in the United Kingdom (UK). The award recognises an Australian who has excelled in their own right in the United Kingdom.

After completing his medical studies in Perth, Da Cruz began his research interest in retinal disease at the Nuffield Laboratory of Ophthalmology, in Oxford in 1990. On completion of the English surgical fellowship he returned to Australia to carry out a PhD at Perth's Lions Eye Institute. He completed his Australian speciality training and carried out a vitreo-retinal surgical fellowship with Ian McAllister in Perth.

He was awarded the NH and MRC post-doctoral fellowship in 1999 and named the Menzies Scholar in Science and Medicine for Australia in 2000. He won the Howard Florey Post-doctoral Fellowship from the Royal Society that brought him to London to study with Prof. Alan Bird. He finished his clinical training with further vitreo-retinal surgical fellowships in London, at Moorfields Eye Hospital where he is now Consultant Retinal Surgeon and Medical Retina Specialist. He is Clinical Lead of the The London Project and Head of the Artificial Retina Programme at Moorfields Eye Hospital.

A maths teacher in first year, Mr Anderson, had a strong influence on Alan's interests and work ethic. Alan established his own business in his early twenties, starting out with an office above Charlie Brown's pizza shop in Chelsea Village and growing to become Australia's largest privately owned independent insurance broker, with offices throughout Australia, alliances with South East Asian and NZ brokers, Lloyds of London accreditation, and 245 employees. He has thoroughly enjoyed the opportunities in this field to meet and work with many extraordinary people.

Alan has served the insurance industry as committee member, president and board director of the National Insurance Brokers Association of Australia, of which he was appointed Honorary Fellow in recognition of his contribution. He has won industry awards and was awarded Member of the Order of Australia in 2019 for his significant service, in particular his involvement with the Financial Services Reform Act.

CLIVE CHOATE 1969




Clive was a student at Wandarra Primary School before he attended Churchlands where he went on to be a prefect. Interschool sports were a special highlight of his high school days especially rugby, athletics, cross country and tennis all of which influenced his later interests and career. Clive was a school athletics champion, a member of a school rowing team whose borrowed boat disintegrated during a race, and a state junior rugby player and captain, representing Australia overseas.

He went on to become a teacher himself, having been motivated and influenced by teachers at Churchlands including Mr Ottaway, Mr L'Estrange, and Mr Parker in PE, Mr Stokes and Mr Young in maths and others including Mr Broom and Mr Christmas.

He recalls Mr Best sending him home for having a Beatles haircut; however he feels he triumphed in that incident as he subsequently wrote a poem about it which won the Year 8 poetry prize for that year. It was published in the school magazine and can no doubt be seen somewhere in today's display. Clive has had a full and varied life as a teacher. community worker, mentor, coach, writer and endurance sportsman. His record of sporting events and successes is astonishing. He was a UWA rugby player and 'Rugby Blue' recipient, playing representative rugby interstate and in New Zealand. He has also represented WA or Australia in triathlon, orienteering, canoe marathon, ironman, rogaining and athletics. He was the winner of the inaugural Blackwood Ironman and completed 25 consecutive Blackwood Ironman races with 17 podium finishes. He is an endurance cyclist, having ridden across the Nullarbor, the Central desert and the Gibb River Road relay in the Kimberley. He is a competitive horseman in endurance events and polo and polocrosse. He has acted as paddle escort in 15 Rottnest Channel swims. And significantly he was the first West Australian to run a marathon on all 7 continents- the final one in Antarctica at the age of 65.

As well as developing his own sporting skills, Clive has made huge contributions to the community through junior sport coaching and administration work. In particular he has assisted disadvantaged teenagers and special needs children to achieve sporting goals and enjoyment.

DR PAUL VOGEL AM 1969




Paul attended Floreat Primary School before commencing at Churchlands in 1965. Paul remembers his years at Churchlands fondly, including the influence of various teachers on matters of life and learning. He particularly recalls that Mr McCumskey did not see Paul's broken neck (from a surfing accident in 1968) as any reason for special treatment and subsequently failed him in chemistry. The effect of this is a little difficult to determine as Paul went on to complete a Bachelor of Science with Honours and a PhD in chemistry at UWA.

Paul has had an extraordinary public career, which has integrated his love of the environment with his scientific training and corporate management skills. He has held senior positions in the department of Premier and Cabinet and in Environmental Protection. He was appointed the inaugural CEO and Chairman of the South Australian Environmental Protection Authority, and was Chairman of the West Australian EPA from 2007 -2015.

He is currently chairman of the Northern Territory EPA and also of a national Cooperative Research Centre on Contamination and Remediation of the Environment. He is a special counsel with Cannings Purple. He has unique knowledge and experience of environmental issues and regulatory matters relating to the delivery of strategic environmental and business outcomes. He was awarded the Member of the Order of Australia this year for his contribution to these important areas.

Paul enjoys footy, wine, travelling, his children and grandchildren, and his tennis club involvement, although he would like to point out these are not listed in any particular order.



MUSIC SCHOLARSHIPS

Congratulations to the Gifted and Talented Year 7 Music students Sophia Bell and Sophie Lenz who were recipients of the 2020 Churchlands Senior High School Foundation Music Scholarship.

The awards were presented at the Year 7 Welcome BBQ held on Thursday 12 March 2020 by Mr John Gillon, Board Member of the Churchlands Senior High School Founation and the then Chairman of the School Board.

In his remarks, Mr Gillon thanked the Churchlands SHS community for their generosity that made the annual scholarships possible. He also mentioned that the current installation of photo voltaic solar panels at the school were funded through generous donations by the community towards the Foundation's solar power project. It is hoped that the savings generated on electricity cost will enable the Foundation to offer other opportunities for students.

The Scholarship provides a sum of \$2000 in the first year of the program (Year 7) and \$500 in the consecutive years up to their last year of High School (Year 12). The Scholarship assists families with expenses related to musical studies and education expenses.

The Foundation encourages parents to get involved to make a difference by making a donation towards the Foundation, no matter how big or small. The Foundation is a registered Deductable Gift Recipient and all donations to the Foundation are tax deductable.

SOLAR POWER PROJECT UPDATE

In October 2016, Churchlands Senior High School Foundation (Inc) had undertaken a brilliant initiative to raise funds and pay for the installation of solar panels to reduce school's power costs through the launch of the 'Solar Power for Scholarships' project.

As part of the project, the Foundation established an annual giving campaign and reached out to parents and alumni for donations. The Foundation has been receiving ongoing donations for this project. Thanks to the generosity of the Alumni, the P&C and past and present parents, over \$800,000 has been raised towards this exciting and innovative project.

With the hardwork of the Foundation Board and through the generous donations by the community, over 1600 solar panels were lifted have been lifted on to the roofs of our four major buildings at the start of the year.

We are excited to announce the installation of Photo Voltaic solar panels is now completed and connected to the grid. Western Power is currently in the process of testing the system. These solar panels installed on the roof of the School will generate significant savings on electricity costs. This will provide approximately 36% of the school's power and generate a return on investment of up to 38% per annum or \$180,000.



The School will be able to get back the money invested within less than three years of installation. Solar Power generates electricity that is clean, renewable and sustainable and therefore, we are excited that we will be contributing to saving the planet.

The net outcome is that students at Churchlands will be able to receive scholarships and benefits each year. It also aims to provide staff initiatives and will look at making this available to two or three staff members.

The Foundation is committed to supporting projects that will create better learning places for our students. Our aim is to create an environment that will encourage students to be creative, inquisitive and passionate – somewhere where they will feel comfortable and inspired.

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

His wealth of knowledge, experience and thoughts certainly inspired and motivated our Year 12s in their pursuit of academic excellence.

Nik Bappoo moved to Australia from Mauritius in 2011 and chose to complete Year 11 and 12 at Churchlands where he was determined to aim high and pursue his dreams.

Nik was a intelligent and outstanding young man and as member of the Breakfast Club back then, he fondly remembers the breakfasts and motivational talks. He went on to UWA and was accepted into the highly competitive Bachelor of Philosophy (Hons) course. Nik managed to combine his love for medical sciences and engineering by pursuing studies in Mechanical Engineering and Pathology and completed his Honours project with the Vascular Engineering Laboratory or VascLab at the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research.

Since then, he has worked in medical innovation including research work involving clinical trials of new technologies, industry work involving medical and surgical 3D printing and is now doing his PhD developing computational models of placental blood flow to predict impaired foetal development.

His work has been extremely well received worldwide and he has received several high calibre international awards, including nearly \$6000 for the Mimics Innovation Award for the Asia-Pacific region in 2017.

LYNDON DA CRUZ 1981

Pormer DUX of the Year in 1981 Professor Lyndon da Cruz was awarded the 2020 'Australian of the Year Great Britain' on Australia Day celebrated in the United Kingdom (UK). The award recognises an Australian who has excelled in their own right in the United Kingdom.

After completing his medical studies in Perth, Da Cruz began his research interest in retinal disease at the Nuffield Laboratory of Ophthalmology, in Oxford in 1990. On completion of the English surgical fellowship he returned to Australia to carry out a PhD at Perth's Lions Eye Institute. He completed his Australian speciality training and carried out a vitreo-retinal surgical fellowship with Ian McAllister in Perth.

He was awarded the NH and MRC post-doctoral fellowship in 1999 and named the Menzies Scholar in Science and Medicine for Australia in 2000. He won the Howard Florey Post-doctoral Fellowship from the Royal Society that brought him to London to study with Prof. Alan Bird. He finished his clinical training with further vitreo-retinal surgical fellowships in London, at Moorfields Eye Hospital where he is now Consultant Retinal Surgeon and Medical Retina Specialist. He is Clinical Lead of the The London Project and Head of the Artificial Retina Programme at Moorfields Eye Hospital.



CLIVE CHOATE 1969



Clive was a student at Wandarra Primary School before he attended Churchlands where he went on to be a prefect. Interschool sports were a special highlight of his high school days especially rugby, athletics, cross country and tennis all of which influenced his later interests and career. Clive was a school athletics champion, a member of a school rowing team whose borrowed boat disintegrated during a race, and a state junior rugby player and captain, representing Australia overseas.

He went on to become a teacher himself, having been motivated and influenced by teachers at Churchlands including Mr Ottaway, Mr L'Estrange, and Mr Parker in PE, Mr Stokes and Mr Young in maths and others including Mr Broom and Mr Christmas.

He recalls Mr Best sending him home for having a Beatles haircut; however he feels he triumphed in that incident as he subsequently wrote a poem about it which won the Year 8 poetry prize for that year. It was published in the school magazine and can no doubt be seen somewhere in today's display. Clive has had a full and varied life as a teacher. community worker, mentor, coach, writer and endurance sportsman. His record of sporting events and successes is astonishing. He was a UWA rugby player and 'Rugby Blue' recipient, playing representative rugby interstate and in New Zealand. He has also represented WA or Australia in triathlon, orienteering, canoe marathon, ironman, rogaining and athletics. He was the winner of the inaugural Blackwood Ironman and completed 25 consecutive Blackwood Ironman races with 17 podium finishes. He is an endurance cyclist, having ridden across the Nullarbor, the Central desert and the Gibb River Road relay in the Kimberley. He is a competitive horseman in endurance events and polo and polocrosse. He has acted as paddle escort in 15 Rottnest Channel swims. And significantly he was the first West Australian to run a marathon on all 7 continents- the final one in Antarctica at the age of 65.

As well as developing his own sporting skills, Clive has made huge contributions to the community through junior sport coaching and administration work. In particular he has assisted disadvantaged teenagers and special needs children to achieve sporting goals and enjoyment.

DR PAUL VOGEL AM 1969




Paul attended Floreat Primary School before commencing at Churchlands in 1965. Paul remembers his years at Churchlands fondly, including the influence of various teachers on matters of life and learning. He particularly recalls that Mr McCumskey did not see Paul's broken neck (from a surfing accident in 1968) as any reason for special treatment and subsequently failed him in chemistry. The effect of this is a little difficult to determine as Paul went on to complete a Bachelor of Science with Honours and a PhD in chemistry at UWA.

Paul has had an extraordinary public career, which has integrated his love of the environment with his scientific training and corporate management skills. He has held senior positions in the department of Premier and Cabinet and in Environmental Protection. He was appointed the inaugural CEO and Chairman of the South Australian Environmental Protection Authority, and was Chairman of the West Australian EPA from 2007 -2015.

He is currently chairman of the Northern Territory EPA and also of a national Cooperative Research Centre on Contamination and Remediation of the Environment. He is a special counsel with Cannings Purple. He has unique knowledge and experience of environmental issues and regulatory matters relating to the delivery of strategic environmental and business outcomes. He was awarded the Member of the Order of Australia this year for his contribution to these important areas.

Paul enjoys footy, wine, travelling, his children and grandchildren, and his tennis club involvement, although he would like to point out these are not listed in any particular order.



The awards were presented at the Year 7 Welcome BBQ held on Thursday 12 March 2020 by Mr John Gillon, Board Member of the Churchlands Senior High School Founation and the then Chairman of the School Board.

In his remarks, Mr Gillon thanked the Churchlands SHS community for their generosity that made the annual scholarships possible. He also mentioned that the current installation of photo voltaic solar panels at the school were funded through generous donations by the community towards the Foundation's solar power project. It is hoped that the savings generated on electricity cost will enable the Foundation to offer other opportunities for students.

The Scholarship provides a sum of \$2000 in the first year of the program (Year 7) and \$500 in the consecutive years up to their last year of High School (Year 12). The Scholarship assists families with expenses related to musical studies and education expenses.

The Foundation encourages parents to get involved to make a difference by making a donation towards the Foundation, no matter how big or small. The Foundation is a registered Deductable Gift Recipient and all donations to the Foundation are tax deductable.

SOLAR POWER PROJECT UPDATE

In October 2016, Churchlands Senior High School Foundation (Inc) had undertaken a brilliant initiative to raise funds and pay for the installation of solar panels to reduce school's power costs through the launch of the 'Solar Power for Scholarships' project.

As part of the project, the Foundation established an annual giving campaign and reached out to parents and alumni for donations. The Foundation has been receiving ongoing donations for this project. Thanks to the generosity of the Alumni, the P&C and past and present parents, over \$800,000 has been raised towards this exciting and innovative project.

With the hardwork of the Foundation Board and through the generous donations by the community, over 1600 solar panels were lifted have been lifted on to the roofs of our four major buildings at the start of the year.

We are excited to announce the installation of Photo Voltaic solar panels is now completed and connected to the grid. Western Power is currently in the process of testing the system. These solar panels installed on the roof of the School will generate significant savings on electricity costs. This will provide approximately 36% of the school's power and generate a return on investment of up to 38% per annum or \$180,000.



The School will be able to get back the money invested within less than three years of installation. Solar Power generates electricity that is clean, renewable and sustainable and therefore, we are excited that we will be contributing to saving the planet.

The net outcome is that students at Churchlands will be able to receive scholarships and benefits each year. It also aims to provide staff initiatives and will look at making this available to two or three staff members.

The Foundation is committed to supporting projects that will create better learning places for our students. Our aim is to create an environment that will encourage students to be creative, inquisitive and passionate – somewhere where they will feel comfortable and inspired.
