





From the Principal

A warm welcome or is it a sigh of "it's over" to Term 1, 2022.

COVID-19 has dominated our thoughts, hearts and minds over the past two years but no more so than the first term of this year. I sincerely hope that all members of our community have successfully negotiated this time with little more than minor health issues and a lot of inconvenience. If health issues were worse for some, I hope for a speedy improvement.

As I write, we are being told by the Department of Health, to expect peak cases and corresponding hospitalisations within the next week. On that basis, and on consulting my crystal ball, that by the time you read this, COVID restrictions will be easing, case numbers declining and we are about to enter a prolonged period of normality.

Towards the end of term we will also celebrate the 50th anniversary of Churchlands School of Music with a major performance at the Concert Hall on June 27, involving current and past students.

Hopefully, by mid-year the path will be cleared for the resumption of the school's international calendar, which has played an important role in the cultural uniqueness of our school.

Beyond all of this Churchlands SHS has been and is predominantly a place of excellence in learning and I plan to re-purpose our thoughts in this direction. Many I know were disappointed in our ATAR results last year and, with the support of new Associate Principal Mr Jamie Long, I hope to rectify this. More importantly we will resume our programs which result in developing the capacity of our teachers to be the best possible teachers and leaders. Of concern to me however, is that surveys conducted late last year also indicate that student behaviour is listed as the most significant issue for parents, teachers and importantly students who clearly want to learn. This, I assure you, will be a major focus for the school on the resumption of Term 2. Further information will be provided as to what form this will take early in the new term.

I hope that the two week break revitalises us all and that all families have a happy and safe holiday while staff reset for Term 2.

Senior Secondary Pathways

Unfortunately, the usual Parent Information Evenings for Year 11 and Year 12 parents could not be held in Term 1.

Important information regarding achievement of the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE), the complexity of ATAR requirements and university entrance has been communicated to parents. A copy of this document has been placed onto our website in the Senior Secondary section.

To support the Year 12 ATAR students, I have been running information sessions on the statistical process of getting an ATAR score, reflection on predicted ATAR and goal setting for the future. I will run a similar process for Year 11 ATAR students once Semester 1 achievement has been finalised.

Ms Clare Slodecki, our Career Development Practitioner, has been meeting with students, engaging in valuable pathway planning conversations, and providing valuable guidance around future pathways to success for all students.

Student Support

We understand that Senior Secondary years can be challenging for students. There are often times throughout the students' journey where they require some extra support, whether it be social, emotional or academic. There are a number of staff available to support students with pastoral care, to enable them to maximise their opportunities for success. Students can access their House Coordinator as a first port of call. The House Coordinator can assist and direct them onto the most appropriate person where needed. The students classroom teachers are the final port of call for academic issues.


I signed up to the duo event and committed to doing the second leg (25km) starting at approximately 4am, following the moon and the tide.




Introducing...Serena Ko

World Building Workshop with Guest Author Meg Caddy

In Week 3, the Year 7 AEP English classes were incredibly lucky because Meg Caddy came to school to give us a short, but extremely helpful and intriguing, insight into how she became an author and why she loves her job so much. Meg is an accomplished writer and has already published two books WAER and Devil's Ballast, both are great reads.

Meg was full of enthusiasm and passion for writing; inspiring us with stories that show how important writing is and how you can let your mind roam free and create it. Meg wanted us all to write, to explore, to wonder and create! Personally, what Meg inspired us to do was really moving and made me want to explore the world of writing more.

Our three AEP English classes all had their workshops in the concert hall or a classroom, though each class had theirs at a different time due to COVID restrictions. During our workshop, we focused on creating a fantasy world and map. Meg read us a passage from her novel *WAER* and we were impressed by the quality of writing she produced and became eager to drink up her writing tips.

Meg explained the importance of having a balanced world like the society we have, e.g. privilege and poverty, good and evil. We drafted a map and included climate, balance and some other hints from Meg – and the results were a lot better than we would have written without this experience.

Finally, we wrote a paragraph in which a character returned to a village they had already visited, describing the scene using our five senses. We left the workshop filled with new knowledge and ideas that we wanted to put into practice in our fantasy worlds.

In Meg's workshop, we came up with and shared ideas that later helped us develop our short stories. We learnt valuable information about how a writer begins to create their world and how the story changes overtime. This was important so we could be prepared to write our fantasy short stories. We also learned about the process it takes to form characters and significant people in the story.

Meg Caddy has been the author of two books with a third on the way, and we were incredibly lucky to get her perspective on writing fantasy stories. Meg has lots of great techniques to enhance our writing and we have all learned a lot from the workshop therefore I hope this opportunity will be available for students in future years.



Formative Assessment at Churchlands

<u>What is it?</u>

The range of activities undertaken by teachers and/or students which provide information to be used during the learning process to improve student attainment and guide the teaching and learning in which they are engaged.

Examples of strategies that can be used in formative assessment tasks include:


- Short quizzes, either online, written or verbal
- Checklists
- Learning journals
- Self and peer feedback activities
- Homework activities

The activities, and how it is conducted will look different in each classroom and across learning areas.

Why is it important?

Strategies used in formative assessment enable students to receive feedback on what they need to do to improve and shows them what to do next to get better. It encourages students to be self-aware decision makers, responsible for their learning. The impact of formative assessment is well researched and has demonstrated that when teachers practice, and students participate in, effective formative assessment both achievement and motivation increase. The infographic below illustrates the key features used in formative assessment.




