HOW DO YOU CHOOSE A SCHOOL?

It's a question many parents begin asking not long after their child is born. And yet, it's one of the most difficult decisions to make, especially before you know what your child's strengths, interests, and needs will be, or even where your family might be living in the future.

Each year at our Year 6 into Year 7 Parent Information Evening, I take a moment to thank families for choosing Churchlands Senior High School. It's a decision we know parents have made thoughtfully, and we're honoured to be part of your child's educational journey.

Choosing a school is about more than just reputation, parents are looking for a balance of academic excellence, strong pastoral care, rich extracurricular opportunities, and a safe, supportive, and high-quality learning environment. I'm proud to say that Churchlands Senior High School continues to be a school of choice for many families. This is reflected in our steady Year 7 enrolment numbers and the consistently high number of applications we receive from families living outside our local intake area.

When I meet prospective parents during our regular school tours, I'm often asked similar questions:

- How does the school support student wellbeing?
- What academic programs are on offer?
- How do you use technology?
- How are students with additional learning needs supported?
- What do we believe great teaching looks like at Churchlands?
- How do you extend academically gifted students?

These are the questions that matter and they speak to the heart of who we are as a school.

At Churchlands Senior High School, we have built robust pastoral care systems that offer multilayered support. Over the past decade, we've significantly expanded our student services team. It now includes Program Coordinators for each year group, school psychologists, Youth Support Coordinators, a VET program Coordinator, a full-time Community Service Coordinator, a

Career Practitioner, and a wide range of learning support staff. This team works collaboratively to provide wraparound support for all students, ensuring they feel seen, heard, and valued throughout their schooling.

Our STEM program has provided our students with opportunities to use the critical and creative thinking skills. They are provided with challenges to find solutions to real world problems. Our STEM Club is lucky to have top class facilities in their new 3.5 million dollar building. Students have access to 3D printers, laser cutters and a range of other equipment and technologies to help them develop their own products.

Beyond the classroom, our extracurricular programs continue to grow. In 2025, our Arts Department is running clubs across all disciplines, from music and drama to visual arts and media. Our Physical Education team also coordinates a variety of sports clubs and interschool teams. Additionally, we offer a strong suite of community service opportunities, empowering students to give back to the community. Each year, I'm inspired by the incredible contributions our students make, some of our Year 12 graduates leave with over 400 hours of community service, leaving a lasting legacy of leadership and compassion.

Our sporting reputation has been a constant, since the school first opened. And whilst we are known for our elite Swimming, AFL, Basketball and Netball programs, and our near consistent success at interschool events, it is the off-field success that we are also proud of. It's the girls fitness program in Year 10, the students who come to the before and after school clubs, the students who volunteer to assist coaching teams, or assist with umpiring. It is the incredible sportsmanship our students show on the field, where they demonstrate their resilience and leadership skills. It is the way our students cheer each other on, and when a teammate falls, they are there to pick them up.

Our Academic Extension Program has had continued success, with a high number of applications being received each year. The Churchlands SHS AEP program started prior to the Department's GATE program, providing an extension program to academically gifted students, which both excelerates them through a compacted curriculum, whist also providing an opportunity to engage them in inter-disciplinary learning.

Our teachers strive to find opportunities for

students beyond the classroom, opportunities that provide visual learning and first hand experiences. Our staff provide guest speakers, camps, interstate and international tours. Examples of these are cultural exchanges to France to live with french families, tours to Canberra and Sydney with the HASS faculty, basketball tours to the US, international music tours and indigenous camps to Shark Bay. These experiences provide opportunities to learn about the world outside of WA and outside of Australia.

Our GATE music program has provided students with overseas tours to locations such as Switzerland, England, Wales, Austria, France, Germany, Canada, USA, China, Hong Kong, and Singapore. The tours occur every three years and involve Year 10, 11 and 12 Music students. This year we will celebrate the 40th year anniversary of our Music Tour to Geneva and London in 1985, where our students gained second place in the prestigious World Youth Music Festival.

Churchlands Senior High School has always been at the forefront of technology in classrooms. We adopted a one-to-one laptop program before most schools, and we were the first, and only school to be able to run our independent IT network. Our students were using industry standard programs above and beyond what many schools have been able to offer, leaving our graduates with industry and job ready skills. Our extensive IT support staff, lead by our director of ICT has consistently provided a high level of support across the school, ensuring that our network is functional and providing a platform for our staff to effectively teach with.

Over the past 10 years we have seen a significant increase in our learning support program, we have grown from a staff of five or six education assistants, to a team which includes a learning support program coordinator, student support staff, education assistants, learning support teachers, literacy experts, school psychologists and clerical staff. With the addition of what we call 'the Hub' this year, we have added an extra safe space for students with additional needs, providing them a quiet working space to undertake form class, classwork or activities during break times.

We're also proud to provide a safe, inclusive, and intellectually stimulating learning environment. Last year, we undertook a whole-school consultation process to better understand what our staff, students, and families believe great teaching looks like. Using this feedback, a

dedicated team of educators worked throughout the year to develop a set of shared beliefs about high-quality teaching and learning.

These beliefs, soon to be published as our "Six Pillars of Teaching and Learning," are:

- Relationships and Inclusivity
- Wellbeing and Support
- · Curiosity and Reflection
- Innovation and Creativity
- · Resilience and Growth
- Cultural Understanding

These statements will guide our teaching practice and help ensure that every student at Churchlands feels supported, challenged, and inspired.

Thank you once again for choosing Churchlands Senior High School. We look forward to continuing this journey with you and your family, and to nurturing the potential of every student who walks through our doors.

SENIOR SECONDARY UPDATE

It has been a busy and productive start to the year, and I have been impressed by the commitment, engagement and maturity of Senior Secondary School students working hard to ensure they are achieving their potential throughout Term 1.

One of the many great traditions in Senior School is the opportunity to purchase a leavers jumper in Year 12. Such a great memento, it was nice to see the Year 12s so excited to receive their leavers jumpers early in the term. It also provides an opportunity for students to have another Churchlands SHS uniform item that they wear with pride. Walking around the school during break times I can see that it is obviously a very popular one.

Acknowledging and celebrating success from 2024

2024 was another very successful year both for Churchlands and it's Year 12 students. There were some outstanding individual achievements from some of our amazing students. Our ATAR Dux Cate Bellamy received a General Exhibition for achieving a WACE score within the top fifty students in the state. Chris Chang achieved the highest examination mark in Business Management and Enterprise and Cassie Bouwer for Philosophy, both students received a Subject Exhibition award for their high level of achievement.

Senior School Pathways

On Monday 17 February we ran an information evening for the parents of Year 12 ATAR students. Valuable information was presented to help improve knowledge and understanding of the statistical adjustment processes of moderation, scaling and standardisation along with ATAR calculation and requirements and the university entrance processes. To support the Year 12 ATAR students, I ran an information session on the statistical process of getting their ATAR, reflecting on their predicted ATAR and goal setting for the future. A copy of the PowerPoint used for the parent evening has been placed onto the website in the Senior School section.

The school provided a parent information session for Year 11 parents on the same evening. The important information regarding achievement of the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE), Vocational Education and Training (VET) opportunities, the complexity of ATAR requirements and university entrance was presented. A copy of the information presented has been placed onto our website in the Senior School section. I will run an information session with Year 11 ATAR students once Semester 1 achievement has been finalised, including ATAR calculations and the statistical

adjustments processes involved.

Career Advice and Support

Our extremely dedicated and highly knowledgeable Career Development Practitioner Mr Iain McAlpine, has been meeting with students to engage in valuable pathway planning conversations and providing important guidance around future pathways to success for all students. Parents are more than welcome to reach out and make an appointment to speak with Mr McAlpine should their young person requires some career guidance.

UniReady

UniReady is in its third year at Churchlands SHS after a very successful year in 2024. This pathway has increased in popularity and there are two classes running this year. The UniReady pathway provides an exciting opportunity for students to gain entry into Curtin University that does not require the calculation of an ATAR score. Students complete four units over the year and have the possibility of getting a notional ATAR of 70 for Curtin.

Student Support

We understand that Senior School can be challenging and there are often times throughout the Senior School journey where students require some extra support, whether it be social, emotional or academic. There are a number of staff available to support students to enable them to maximise their opportunities for success. Students can access their House Coordinator as a first port of call who can assist and direct them onto the most appropriate person where needed. Support staff available in Senior School:



A FRESH START IN HOME ECONOMICS

Meanwhile, in Childcare and Family Studies, students have been learning about child development and the importance of play in early learning.

Hospitality students have been stepping into the world of customer service, practicing presentation skills, and understanding the expectations of the hospitality industry. Food Science classes are delving into the science behind food preparation, investigating why ingredients behave the way they do in different cooking processes.

CAD - Computer Aided Design

AUTODESK FUSION 360

This term, our Year 11 and 12 students have been delving into the exciting world of CAD (Computer-Aided Design) using Autodesk Fusion 360. Over the course of five weeks, students have had the opportunity to design and draw items related to a different theme each week, honing their skills and expanding their understanding of the software's powerful functions.

Each week, students have tackled a new challenge, bringing their unique ideas to life with precision and creativity. The topics ranged from everyday objects to more complex designs, offering a diverse range of experiences. Whether designing simple tools or imagining futuristic gadgets, students have used Fusion 360's range of tools to create accurate and innovative models.

Week by week breakdown:

Week 1 – Something from the Kitchen

The first week focused on designing practical items commonly found in the kitchen. Students used essential CAD functions such as sketching, extruding, and cutting to design tools and utensils, allowing them to develop real-world, functional designs.

Week 2 – Something that Floats

In week two, students explored the concept of buoyancy and designed objects that float. This topic challenged students to think floating devices, such as boats or water toys, while refining their skills in detailing and refining their 3D models using Fusion 360's advanced tools.

Week 3 – A Car Part

During week three, students shifted their focus to automotive design. They designed parts for cars, such as gears, body components, or accessories.

Week 4 - An Item of Jewellery

In week four, students explored the art of designing jewellery. They created models of rings, necklaces, and other accessories, learning about precision design, small-scale detailing, and how to incorporate aesthetics with functional geometry to create beautiful and wearable pieces.

Week 5 - A Communication Device

For the final week, students were encouraged to design a communication device, whether a smartphone, radio, antique or futuristic gadget. This week emphasized creativity and

innovation, as students considered how emerging technologies could impact communication and how their designs could evolve to meet these challenges.

Throughout these weeks, students have not only gained technical proficiency with Fusion 360 but have also developed problem-solving skills, learned to collaborate effectively, and discovered the power of CAD tools in bringing their ideas to life. They have gained confidence in their ability to create 3D models that can be used for prototyping, manufacturing, or even virtual simulations.

The students' work is a testament to their creativity, perseverance, and the incredible potential of CAD design in today's world. As they move forward, these skills will be invaluable, whether they choose to pursue careers in design, engineering, or technology.

We can't wait to see where their imagination and newfound CAD expertise will take them next! Keep up the great work, Year 11 and 12 students!

The Hub is staffed by a dedicated team of teachers and pastoral care support staff who are committed to helping students succeed. They are there to provide assistance with academic tasks, emotional regulation, and any other support students may need.

Funded students are granted access to The Hub through a Hub Access Card, which requires parent permission. This ensures that every student who needs the support The Hub offers can access it in a way that works for them and their family.


