From the Principal

We are at the half-way mark for 2023. The previous six months have brought surprises, change and concerns. A king now sits on the Throne in England, American politics is again rearing its ugly (to some) head, the war in Ukraine continues, while in Australia it appears that we sit somewhere between a recession and an Economic downturn. In Western Australia no doubt the biggest surprise was a change in leadership with Mark McGowan stepping down.

Meanwhile at Churchlands the past few weeks have been a carbon copy of previous years; exams for Years 10, 11 and 12, teachers marking and collaborating to ensure comparability between classes doing the same courses and finally completing reports which will become available for all students by terms end.

Reflecting on activities and events from Semester 1, I must mention the Twilight Jazz Concert held late March, our successes in the pool and the School Ball as standout events of Term 1, followed quickly by the school production of "Puffs" early in Term 2. Our amazing musos kicked off with their concert season for Senior, Intermediate and Junior students who all showcased their incredible skills and development.

In speaking about our music program it is wonderful to see that International tours are recommencing for the first time since COVID-19 shut the state and Australia down. Our students departed on Sunday 18 June for Japan where they will not only gain an amazing cultural experience but will have fantastic performance opportunities. They will also visit our sister school in Akashi Nishi who will make their long awaited return to Churchlands, arriving at the beginning of August. We are now in the planning stages to commence our Language based international tours to Japan and France in 2024.

The school's Leadership team are currently undertaking a Business Plan "check in" to ensure that targets and strategies as outlined in our plan are on track to be implemented and/or met. By the end of this term we have completed this audit for the three areas High Quality Teaching, Effective Leadership and Learning Environment.

If you have been keeping up with reading our "Bytes" you will not have missed the articles around FORMATIVE ASSESSMENT. I am sure all parents are familiar with an assessment and the resulting mark of 60% or 6 out of 10 but this is not what we refer to as formative assessment. Current research has shown that a focus on formative assessment clearly enhances student outcomes. To that end it has been

an area for our teachers to develop their skills in applying this both in the classroom and in marking work.

The key to formative assessment is effective "feedback". When a student undertakes a task or an assessment, how can a teacher provide feedback to that student so that they gain greater understanding of the task. Currently all Year 7 and 8 programs are written to ensure formative assessment tasks form part of the learning. Ms Kym Lucchesi has been appointed as our Formative Assessment Coordinator and is keen to engage parents in her work.

Since late last year the School Board has established new protocols for reviewing existing school policies. Besides establishing a common format, this has enabled stakeholders to consider documentation. This will ensure the documentation is fit for purpose and meets expectations of an ever changing parent, student and staff body. It is hoped that we will have concluded this review by the end of this year.

This is an opportune time for me to acknowledge outgoing Chair of the School Board, Katherine Sturley. Katherine was elected to the Board as a parent member in 2019 and then elected as Chair in 2021, a role in which she has continued to date. Katherine has brought great expertise to the role but it is her thoughtful and caring approach to all members regardless of undertaking that has been a hallmark of her tenure. She has my thanks. I would also take this opportunity to welcome Dr Genevieve McSporran to the role as Board Chair and look forward to working with her over the coming years.

The Semester 1 exams were run in Term 2. Across Years 11 and 12 this was the largest number of course examinations and largest number of students sitting exams at Churchlands and will likely remain the largest as numbers decrease in 2024. There were close to 600 students completing exams in over 50 different courses. I must commend the students, it all ran very smoothly and most students arrived early, well prepared and followed the Sickness and Misadventure process when required.


For our Year 11 ATAR students the Semester 1 exams are the first round of exams they attempt in Senior Secondary. For some students this will be the first three-hour exam they have completed. While exams are seen by some as stressful, the opportunity to sit an exam, practice the process of answering exam style questions under timed conditions and then obtaining feedback is invaluable. During this time our students who are enrolled in Workplace Learning carried out their first placement in Industry. It was pleasing to read some of the amazing feedback the students received from the various placements. I hope all students benefited from their placement and learned new things about their industry.

Course selections for 2024 Year 11

After completing a semester of Senior Secondary and the first round of exams for ATAR students, now is a time for reflection. Students need to take into consideration their current performance and carefully choose courses for next year. Achievement

of the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) must be the priority for all students. Course selections need to ensure that students are on the right pathway to success.

I was delighted to see the number of parents attend the Year 11 Parent Information Evening, obtaining valuable information around future successful pathways and engaging with key staff in



relation to specific courses for their young people. This information is available on the school website. Students will be given a similar presentation to ensure that all stakeholders are aware of expectations, pathways and future success.

Subject Selection Online (SSO) will be used to manage the course selection process. The Year 12 Course Selection Handbook is available on our website under 'Learning' and 'Senior Secondary'. It's important to note that students should aim to achieve eight 'C' grades or equivalents in Year 11 to be on track to achieving WACE moving into Year 12.

Year 10

Our Career Development Practitioner has been working with the Year 10 students on their transition program in preparation for choosing courses for Year 11 in 2024. Every student has received a planning tool to help in choosing their right courses to achieve success and move towards their intended career. The Year 11 Course Selection Handbook, available on the school website under

'Learning' and 'Senior Secondary', provides a wealth of information and I encourage all parents and students to read its contents. The Year 10 Parent Evening and Learning Area Expo was well attended, and it was pleasing to see staff and parents engaging in some informative and insightful conversations.



Please note that courses in both Year 11 and Year

12 are 'year-long', therefore the grade awarded at the end of the year is the grade received for both Semester1 and Semester 2.

Year 11 Predicted ATAR and High Achievers

Following the finalisation of marks from exams and Semester 1 reports, the data will be analysed and ATAR predictions calculated. Students will be provided with their first round of predicted ATAR in Senior Secondary along with an information session outlining the processes used to obtain their ATAR. Students who have a predicted ATAR of 95 or higher will be invited to join the 2023/2024 Breakfast Club. The inaugural Breakfast Club for our Year 11 high achievers will be held in Term 3.

Year 12 Breakfast Club

Our Year 12 Breakfast Club was held on Friday 19 May in the Mentelle room at the Rendezvous Scarborough with the beach and beautiful Indian Ocean as our backdrop. We had 53 students achieve a predicted ATAR of 95 or above based on their final results in Year 11. It's a wonderful opportunity to acknowledge these students who really are 'aiming high' and allow them to listen to a Churchlands Alumni's journey and tips for success. The guest speaker on this occasion was Associate Professor Geoff Lummis from the School of Education at Edith Cowan University.

As we approach the midway point of the year, we have several important updates and events to share with you.



2023 is flying by for the Year 10 students with so many important events already happened, ranging from exams to thinking about Year 11 subject choices, carnivals, music performances and the school production.


This year marks more than halfway through the high school journey for our students and it has been great to see an improvement in their maturity and resilience towards their studies.



Dylan Williams is a Professor Emeritus of Educational Assessment at the University College in London. For the past 20 years, William's work has focused on the profound impacts of embedding classroom formative assessment on the student learning.



The materials he has developed provide a structure that underpins our formative assessment initiative with the five strategies highlighted below forming the basis of professional learning courses we provide at the school and the activities are implementing in our classrooms. Many of these examples could be used to illustrate more than one of the strategies.



My group saw two mantas, two reef sharks, three schools of fish, six turtles and 1 octopus. It was amazing and absolutely one of the most exciting and thrilling experiences I've had. Unfortunately, one of the groups' boat broke down while in stormy weather and they got stranded for a few hours. They had lots of fun on a rocky boat waiting to be rescued.

I think that one of the best things at the actual camp was the talk with a marine biologist, Frazer McGregor. He told us about lots of amazing things, like how the direction and temperature of the currents can affect the corals' growth, and how everything alive in a certain area relies on a balanced ecosystem to survive. We also discovered how manta rays are named by the print on their belly resembling something. I learnt some new and interesting facts from Frazer.

Some advice I would give to Year 7s going on this camp in 2024 is that you should give everything a go and try to get out of your comfort zones and do new things, because it will really make this camp worthwhile if you do. Live in the moment and be social and make new friends.

Workplace Learning Work Experience

The Workplace Learning (WPL) endorsed program provides an opportunity for a student to demonstrate and develop increasing competence in the core skills for work, often referred to as generic, transferable or employability skills.

A student learns to apply and adapt the workplace skills that are necessary for different types of work and that play a key role in lifelong learning. The endorsed program is based on the skills, knowledge and understandings that underpin successful participation in work.

Students enrolled in WPL enjoyed a two week block at a variety of work placements in Semester 1. These ranged from the trades to education to hospitality placements. In the majority of cases, feedback received from employers was extremely positive. Some students had offers of employment and traineeships, which was very pleasing.



While in their placements, students had to complete a Workplace Learning Journal which details the requirements of the endorsed program and the expectations, rights and responsibilities of the student in the workplace.







