# From the **Principal**

### A GREAT DEAL GOING ON...

Traditionally the busiest term of the school year, term 2 commenced with a staff professional development day with a focus on our quality Teaching and Learning Framework with a specific emphasis on student engagement.

Followed by the Coral Bay Camp in week 2, a camp which became very memorable for the wrong reasons. Together, 62 students from Year 8 AEP and five teachers arrived at Learmouth airport for a week of activities with the local CALM office. Little did they expect the salmonella outbreak, which significantly affected some 30% of the student body. Severe symptoms appeared on Wednesday, and a makeshift infirmary was created in the students' tent land in an effort to isolate unwell students. The issue was brilliantly managed by John Carr (Head of the HASS learning area) and expertly supported by Science teacher David Cox who was a former paramedic. Lots of subset stories evolved, but the most significant of these was the return journey back from Learmouth. As students boarded the plane and were expecting to take off, the pilot reported a problem and required all passengers to disembark. All returned to the "small" airport for a nine hour wait until a replacement plane was flown up from Perth. Parents (were kept well informed throughout) collected children from Perth airport at 1:30am not the expected 6:00pm. Certainly, a tour with lots of memories!

In the midst of this, at school, the cast and crew were busy preparing for the school production. A memorable performance of Alice in Wonderland with shows on Friday night, Saturday matinee and Saturday night. Congratulations to teachers Bee Tandy and Sam Hattingh for their skill and hard work to bring this together.

Following that, it was the Churchlands P&C's turn with the opening of the "Creating Communities" Art Exhibition on Friday 23 May. This was the 22nd continuous Art Exhibition held by the school and what a fabulous success it was once again. The focus has always been around engaging with our community and bringing them into the school while also raising some money for the P&C. My thanks and congratulations go to the Art Committee lead by Gabriella Jerrat on their wonderful work.

The Music Department's concert seasons came and went, school tours were conducted, School Board and P&C meetings and exams all added to a hectic term

Churchlands also got on the front foot with respect to eScooters and developed an eRideables policy in the weeks before this became a headline item due to a tragic death in the CBD. This was presented in

draft form to the School Board in May and I expect the final version to be ratified at the June Board meeting.

I would like to acknowledge our Student Council led by School Captains Sienna Van Maanen and Paige Pickford who have galvanized the student body to take part in the Push Up Challenge. This is designed to raise money for Mental Health challenging participants to complete 3,214 push-ups between 4 June and 26 June. This is the number of Australians who have lost their lives to suicide in 2024. When Churchlands students previously participated in this event we were in the top 10 fund raising schools in Australia. Please support if you are able.

for Year 11 in 2026. Every student has received a planning tool to help in choosing their right courses to achieve success and move towards their intended career. The Year 11 Course Selection Handbook, available on the school website under 'Learning' and 'Senior Secondary', provides a wealth of information and I encourage all parents and students to read its contents. As with Year 11, SSO will be used with more information around this process to be emailed to parents at the start of Term 3. The Year 10 Parent Evening and Learning Area Expo was well attended, and it was pleasing to see staff and parents engaging in some informative and insightful conversations.

Please note that courses in both Year 11 and Year 12 are 'year-long', therefore the grade awarded at the end of the year is the grade received for both Semester 1 and Semester 2.

Year 11 Predicted ATAR and High Achievers Following the finalisation of marks from exams and Semester 1 reports, the data will be analysed and ATAR predictions calculated. Year 11 Students will be provided with their first round of predicted ATAR in Senior School along with an information session outlining the processes used to obtain their ATAR. ## MIDDLE SCHOOL MILESTONES

As we approach the end of Term 2, it's a fitting time to reflect on the achievements and important milestones our Middle Secondary students have reached.

### Academic Focus and Assessment Milestones

Our Year 10 students successfully completed their Semester 1 examinations. These exams offered students a valuable insight into the expectations of senior school assessments, including sitting longer exams in a formal, collective setting. The students conducted themselves with maturity and focus throughout the process. Exam results have been published on SEQTA and will be followed by formal reports, which will be available to families on Friday 4 July.

OLNA testing also took place this term for eligible students. Results are now available via SEQTA. It is important to note that OLNA is a requirement for those students who did not meet the minimum standard in NAPLAN literacy and numeracy assessments in previous years. When the NAPLAN summary results will be released, families may notice students placed across four proficiency levels: Exceeding, Strong, Developing, and Needs Support. While this categorisation helps identify learning progress, it can sometimes be unclear. For example, some students who are classified as "Strong" may still be required to sit OLNA based on specific skill areas. Further information will follow from the school.

### **Sporting and Broader Achievements**

Middle Secondary students continue to shine in sporting arenas. Churchlands athletes proudly represented the school in interschool competitions this term, showcasing teamwork, determination, and sportsmanship. Congratulations to all students who participated in athletics, cross country, and winter sports competitions, your efforts have not gone unnoticed!

### Looking Ahead: Subject Selection for 2026

Planning for 2026 is already underway. Subject selections for current Year 9 and 10 students will open on Monday 21 July. Parents and guardians will receive detailed information via email in the coming weeks, and the school website will be updated to guide students and families through the process.

### A Personal Note

As this term comes to a close, so does my tenure as Head of Middle Secondary. It has been a privilege to support our students and families through this crucial stage of learning. From the start of Term 3, Mrs Grayson will take on this role. I will be moving into the Senior Secondary leadership position and look forward to continuing to support many of our students as they progress into their final years of schooling.

### SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA **INDIAN PACIFIC - IAMES LEDGER**

The symphony orchestra were privileged to have an opportunity to perform a composition by local composer James Ledger at the Senior concert earlier this term. Mr Ledger generously gave up his time to cone and rehearse the piece with the orchestra over a number of weeks leading up to the performance and conducted the piece on the night. It is not often that students have an opportunity to be conducted by the composer of the piece they are performing, and we all really appreciated Mr Ledger's time, patience and expertise in what was an extremely rewarding experience for us all. In addition to his many professional roles, James is also a dad to one of the symphony orchestra members, Principal double bassist Mardi, so this was an extra special moment for them both.

James is currently Chair of Composition at the Conservatorium of Music at the University of Western Australia in addition to being a renowned composer with a breadth of work spanning solo, chamber and orchestral music. He has been





commissioned by and held residencies with leading ensembles and arts organisations around Australia. James released two ARIA award-winning albums with Paul Kelly: Conversations with Ghosts and Thirteen Ways to Look at Birds, and he has won APRA Art Music Awards for three orchestral works. His most recent work, The Light Fantastic was commissioned by WASO to commemorate the orchestra's residency at Winthrop Hall.

Indian Pacific, composed in 1996, was James's first orchestral work. It was named after the train which journeys across Australia and is built around an unrelenting chugging guaver rhythm that remains fairly constant throughout the piece. Amongst the extensive percussion is a small length of railway track that is played with metal beaters for that authentic train-spotting experience!

The students did a great job performing a challenging work, and it was an extra special occasion having the composer himself preparing them and directing them for the performance.

## **Technologies Engaging in practical learning**

### **NOURISHING MINDS AND CREATIVITY IN HOME ECONOMICS - TECHNOLOGIES**

This term has been an exciting and rewarding one in Home Economics – Technologies, with students across all year levels exploring creativity, developing practical skills, and engaging in wellbeing strategies that support both their learning and personal growth.

### Year 8 - A Taster of What's to Come

Our Year 8 students have just completed their Muffin Task, a fun and nutritious challenge where they adapted a basic muffin recipe by incorporating a fruit or vegetable to boost its nutritional value. While fruit was the popular choice (no surprises there!), every student demonstrated creativity and attention to detail by plating and garnishing their muffins to make them look as good as they tasted.

In Textiles, students are proudly finishing their pencil case projects and celebrating their new skills, particularly learning to use a sewing machine, a fantastic milestone for many first-time sewers.

With parent morning teas just around the corner, students are preparing to showcase their hospitality and food preparation skills by serving up delicious treats to welcome our quests. These events offer a valuable real-world experience and are just the beginning of an exciting Home Economics journey at Churchlands, with many engaging and enriching courses on offer from Years 9 to 12.

### Year 9 - Expanding Interests and Skills

Year 9 students have the option to dive deeper into Foods and Textiles, with a wide variety of exciting subjects.

In Food Around the World, students are taken on a culinary adventure, exploring Asian cuisine in one term and European cookery in the next, learning new techniques and flavours along the way. Fab Fast Food, a newer course, challenges students to prepare healthier versions of popular foods through engaging activities like mystery box and design challenges.

Textiles students can choose Fun with Fabrics in Semester 1 and Fashion Creation in Semester 2, creative courses where they make pyjamas, stuffed toys, and other beginner-friendly items. It's a great opportunity for students to express themselves and grow confident in using sewing tools and techniques.
