



From the Principal

STEM Building now complete

Earlier this term, Churchlands hosted students and teachers from Akashi Nishi High School as we continue this fantastic Japanese Exchange Program after its COVID interruptions. Two teachers and 24 students arrived in early August engaging in a range of curricula and non-curricula activities. As always, the greatest benefit of these exchanges is the time spent with host families. To these families and to the Churchlands staff led by Mrs Lee Ellis, I extend my thanks and congratulations on another successful exchange. Almost as soon as Akashi Nishi students left, Mrs Ellis was hosting a planning meeting with parents and students keen to reciprocate the exchange program and travel to Japan next year.

Churchlands is no longer the largest school in the Western suburbs as we have two significantly larger schools in Carine SHS and Shenton College on either side of us. These two schools have enrolments now in excess of 2500 and are growing, which is possibly a factor in increasing interest in our school. As an example, this term we have finalised our AEP testing with a further 75 students sitting the HAST exam. We have had in excess of 240 parents participating in one of our school tours and we currently have in excess of 350 enrolment applications to process.

I am pleased to report that the STEM building will have been handed over to the school by the time you read this newsletter. This represents the first time I can recall a building project completed some two months ahead of schedule. Well done to the Architects and Builder. On 11 September the STEM building was officially handed over, however a formal opening date has yet to be finalised.

How amazing it is to have the premium music school in Western Australia as your local Senior High School. Term 3 always brings about the final concert series for Senior Middle and Junior ensembles, orchestras and choirs. These concerts were held in the latter half of the term with outstanding performances across all age groups. Term four will see the music department turn its focus towards auditions for the range of ensembles to be established for 2025.

A significant role for students at Churchlands SHS is to have the opportunity to engage in leadership and representation of the remaining student body. Our School Captains are the most significant part of the leadership groups and we are currently running a process to select two School captains for 2025. Six students applied through writing an application, followed by an interview aimed at addressing essential criteria. A final part of the process is the opportunity to address the current Year 11 students, who along with staff will have the opportunity to vote for their representative. However, the final selection takes equally into account all three processes.

Churchlands community provides fantastic support to our school through a range of voices. Our P&C is closely engaged in forging community links as is our School Board which also has a Governance aspect to it. The Churchlands Foundation has and continues to financially support the school. I wish to also acknowledge the Churchlands Alumni committee represented by a group of past students and teachers. Their behind the scenes work in ensuring the school's history and artefacts are maintained is critical to building on the culture of Churchlands SHS. Late in term 3, the school celebrated their work by holding an afternoon tea as an acknowledgement.

Finally, as we approach the end of Term 3, our Year 12 ATAR students are in the midst of their most important academic period of schooling. They will have completed or all but completed their "mock" exams and are approaching their final "study cram" as they prepare for their most important ATAR exams. In between this, many will also undertake their practical exams. From the entire Churchlands community and myself, we send them our best wishes.

Term three is always a busy time for our Senior School students in particular our Year 12s as they approach the end of their time at Churchlands SHS.

The Breakfast Club

The Breakfast Club is fantastic program that has been running for many years and is one of a number of strategies the schools uses to acknowledge, motivate and support students in the pursuit of academic excellence. Students are invited to join the club if they have a predicted ATAR of 95 or more following the Semester 1 exams in Year 11. This places them in the top 5% of students in the state. After each subsequent exam period students who demonstrate the high academic standard will join the Breakfast Club. I would like to congratulate those students that joined the Breakfast Club this year.

This term the Breakfast Club members attended the Mentelle Room at the Rendezvous Scarborough, where they enjoyed a lovely breakfast with former student Dr David Gozzard. David was Head Boy of the graduating class of 2007. With a keen interest in aircraft, space flight and renewable energy David went on to study Mechanical Engineering and Physics at the University of Western Australia. He continued his studies, undertaking a PhD in Physics working on the Square Kilometre Array, a mammoth project involving more than 600 scientists and engineers from over 20 different countries to build the world's largest and most powerful radio telescope. For this work, David was awarded Student Scientist of the Year at the 2017 WA Premier's Science Awards. David is currently working to build a quantum telescope while teaching Physics at UWA.

The launch of the Breakfast Club for our Year 11 students will take place early next term. I look forward to sharing this experience with you where our guest speaker will provide you with inspiration and motivation as you approach your Semester Two exams.

Class of 2024

It is an exciting and busy time for our Year 12 students. With only a few weeks remaining of their compulsory education the Year 12s are finishing off the year with Mock exams or completing their second work placement. I encourage our ATAR students to take a balanced approach to their study and exams, ensuring they take the time to exercise and as well as eat and sleep well.

This term saw students engage in their personalized planning meetings with either Ms Sally Topley or Mr Iain McAlpine our Career Practitioner, making sure they are well informed to take the next step in their future pathways. These are wonderful opportunities to engage with expert practitioners to get an informed insight into ways they can prepare themselves for the upcoming WACE exams and life after school. Hopefully, they have taken advantage of these conversations and can enter the next phase of their lives with confidence.

It has been a pleasure to see all Year 12 students work so hard in all the areas across the school, whether it was in music, sport, hospitality or the courses they are completing to ensure they finish their final year of schooling to the best of their ability.

Class of 2025

Our Year 11 students are fast approaching the end of their first year in Senior School and are preparing for second semester exams or the second round of work placements. Early in the term, reflecting on their academic achievement and intended future pathways they completed the course selection process for 2025.

It was wonderful to see many students take on the amazing opportunity of the Curtin UniReady program as part of their Year 12 studies. The successful completion of the UniReady Program provides students with an ATAR of 70 for Curtin University. This provides them with pathway into a wide range of undergraduate degrees without the requirements of an ATAR. 2025 will be the third year this program has run.

I look forward to working with staff and students in this program and seeing the range of opportunities that unfold.

Naplan and OLNA

During this term, Middle Secondary students have had the of opportunity to engage in a range of activities. One of them is Try-A-Trade which focused on plumbing and painting where 10 of our Year 10 students were engaged. Students report that this experience was very valuable and a great chance to consider their options for the future as they experience different trades.

At the assembly in Week 10 there were awards for a variety of activities including those students who have completed 50 and 100 hours of community service.

Subjects for 2025

The Subject Selection (SSO) process is now complete and the timetable for 2025 is currently being developed. In Week 2 of Term 4, students will be provided with a list of the options they have been placed in based on their selections. In most cases, students will have received their first preferences but if a subject has been cancelled due to insufficient numbers, they will have probably received their first reserve. I would like to thank you the parents and students in completing the selections.

There will be a brief opportunity to change subjects/ courses towards the end of the year, but this will only be possible if there is space in the class the students wish to move into. Further specific information will be provided in due course.

NAPLAN and OLNA

Students in Year 9 received their NAPLAN results electronically early in Term 3. We shall provide a hard copy of the NAPLAN results at the end of this term. Your student has also received an Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment Report, electronically, in SEQTA. Parents of students that need to sit OLNA in Week 3 of Term 4 have been notified with a timetable of when the tests are scheduled.

The Mathematics Learning Area will provide extra assistance for Numeracy preparation in Weeks 8, 9 and 10 of Term 3 and Weeks 1 and 2 of Term 4.

The English Learning Area will provide Literacy assistance during normal English class time. The Year 9 English course outline has been adapted to provide the necessary time for this purpose

Those students who receive equitable access to assessments (rest breaks, extra working time etc) will have these incorporated into the online platform. Further information on how to access rest breaks will be provided to students through the Churchlands Bytes and at an information session at school.

Year 11s getting organised

How quickly the year is going. Every time we catch up with students they seem to have grown to even higher heights.

After the initial excitement and some level of uncertainty, our new white shirters have settled into their courses well and the Year 11 team has expressed how our students are developing into responsible adults.

Exams and Workplace Learning

Many students have responded to the increased level of responsibility with good study routines and accessing the additional study sessions that were offered. A high proportion of Year 11s attended these sessions and the teachers assisting commented on the excellent behaviours of all students.

While a number of ATAR students were sitting exams, many others tried out their skills in placements for Workplace Learning. This is an exciting time for these students to test their abilities and identify the types of work they enjoy and may wish to pursue in future.

It is important that the Year 11s continue to develop sound habits to use their time effectively and continue to participate in sports and other leisure activities. School is a training ground for the life skills needed when you leave.

Further, it was wonderful to see many of our Year 11 students selling the raffle tickets for three beautifully presented hampers and the \$400 raised went to World Vision.





Predicted ATARs

The predicted ATARs were calculated after the Semester 1 exams and it is very pleasing to see that our Year 11s ATAR students are tracking well with a very high median score of 88. Although this is an early prediction it is a good indicator that our Year 11 ATAR students are looking good.

Thursday's Year 11 Assembly program

The Period Five Program has continued with presentations and information to better equip our students for the stresses of exams, life pressures and for better decision making.

Ms Kath Blackman from Royal Perth Hospital (RPH) conducted a Prevent Alcohol and Risk-related Trauma for Youth (PARTY) presentation at RPH for our Year 11 Health Studies students and then she came to Churchlands to deliver that presentation to the whole cohort. It was designed to illustrate how quickly actions can have a traumatic effect on your future endeavours. Her presentation focused on informing students how they can make decisions to minimise or remove the risk when undertaking activities such as driving or being a passenger or choices of clothing and safety equipment when working in what could be hazardous. The presentation although quite confronting was well received by the students.

Ms Claire Eaton also came in to talk to the students about Handling Change, Challenges and Setbacks.

The presentation was well received as tips for the students to face challenges and feelings of uncertainty were given. She explained the reactions and emotions we go through when faced with challenges and identified the hormones responsible for them when they are in high levels. A term Ms Eaton referred to was "liminal space" where there is a void between where you are now and where you want to be, and she explained that the feelings that go with that uncertainty and feeling unstable are normal. Six questions were posed that we all face at various times in our lives:

- 1. Who am I?
- 2. Who am I important to?
- 3. Where do I fit in?
- 4. What's important to me?
- 5. What am I good for?
- 6. What's my purpose?

In response to these questions Claire suggested students ask themselves; What can I keep doing? What can I do less of? What could I do more of? and How can I help someone else?

Year 11 Report

All of this information relates to how we can manage what is in our control and, although hard to practice, she suggested listing all the things you like doing and want to do more and put it in a place that is visual and can bring you back to managing the challenges and setbacks you will face.

It was a great message for the students to appreciate that we cannot avoid challenges and setbacks but we can often choose how we respond and get going again to turn it around.

SSO for 2025

Year 12 may feel like it's some time away but subject selections have been progressed for most students for 2025 with a few minor changes where the choices are not the best fit. A number of students have indicated that they do not know what they wish to do when they leave school and so they feel more pressure in making their choices. We want to encourage our students to do what they enjoy and do it well. as you are more likely to succeed.

After the presentation on the Uniready course a number of Year 11s have opted in for this program next year. Uniready is a wonderful initiative for those students that have less than 4 ATAR subjects and will not generate an ATAR score to still have a pathway to university if they wish to. It also includes those students that may not meet the minimum ATAR of 70 for offers to University to develop the necessary skills for entry.

Certificate II of Conservation and Land Management Promotion

Students currently participating in this course were set a task of communicating to Year 10s the features of the course and why they should consider it as part of their subject choices for Year 11 in 2025. This was a great initiative and used as part of their assessment in communication skills.



Why Metacognition is Key to Your Child's Success with Formative Assessment

As parents, you want to support your children in their educational journey, helping them achieve their best in school and beyond. One of the most effective tools in education today is formative assessment, which provides ongoing feedback to students as they learn. They might realise that they need to start their preparation earlier or break their work into smaller, more manageable tasks. By reflecting on what works and what doesn't, your child can develop strategies that make them more resilient in the face of challenges.


Encouraging Lifelong Learning

Example

Understanding

How You Can Support Metacognition at Home

Conversations

Goal Setting

Simple conversations can make a big difference. When discussing schoolwork or upcoming tests, ask questions that prompt your child to think about their learning process, such as, "How do you plan to study for this?" or "What strategies have worked well for you in the past?" These questions encourage your child to reflect on their approaches and consider how they might improve.

Encourage your child to set goals for their learning and to think about how they'll achieve them. After they receive feedback, discuss what they learned from it and how they might use that information moving forward. This kind of support helps your child develop the habits that will make them more effective learners.

Metacognition is a powerful tool that can help your child make the most of formative assessments. By thinking about their own thinking, they can take control of their learning, become better problem solvers, and develop the skills needed for lifelong success. As parents, you can support this journey by fostering an environment where reflection and self-assessment are encouraged. 






HASS Geography - Field excursions

Year 12 ATAR - Metropolitan Perth – A liveable and sustainable city?

One of the best and most enjoyable experiences we can offer our students is to get them out into the field. The Year 12 Geography students had the opportunity again this year to relate what they learn in class to real life. One of the prerequisites in Geography is fieldwork, so in taking this course students are out at least twice throughout the year.

The Year 12s enjoyed a recent fieldwork excursion studying their city, its land use zones, urban processes, challenges and planning strategies that the government has implemented to address the challenges Perth faces. Our studies took the class to West Perth to complete a land use transect, to Kings Park to practise field sketches, to East Perth to look at the \$127 million urban renewal project, to Northbridge to see historical links to ethnic cultures and to Cockburn Central to check out a transit-oriented development. We noted the urban challenges of housing, urban sprawl and traffic congestion and evaluated the sustainability and liveability of strategies proposed and being implemented in our city.







Year 11 ATAR Swan Valley Excursion

The Year 11 Geography classes participated in a field excursion to the scenic Swan Valley this term. Our Unit 2 Depth Study course centres on 'tourism' so what better place to go than the Swan Valley, right on our doorstep! The students research activities designated for tourists, the importance and value of the industry to the region and Western Australia, both domestically and internationally.

At the Swan Valley Visitor Centre, the students were given a brief history of the region which now boasts not only 40 wineries, but a plethora of fun activities and gourmet delights to enjoy. Following this, the class enjoyed coffee, chocolate sampling and presentations at both Yahava Koffee works and the Margaret River Chocolate Factory. Upper Reach Winery hosted the group next with insightful information about the region's viticulture industry and gastronomic tourism in the Valley. Upper Reach is a small gourmet winery that has solid connections on the international market and a strong domestic customer base.

Holocaust Institute of WA

Recently the Year 11 and 12 Modern History students were given the unique opportunity to visit the new and developing Holocaust Institute at Yokine. Our students were fully engaged in the "Courage to Remember" workshop that enhanced the learning that takes place back at school. The first half of the workshop provided a detailed context of events that led to the rise of Nazi Germany by exploring the political and social setting of post-World War I Germany. This was followed by the second half of the workshop in which we examined the anatomy of the Holocaust involving many of the events of the 1930s, the outbreak of World War II, life in the Ghettos and the "Final Solution" to Liberation. Lastly, a moving testimony was given by the daughter of Holocaust survivor. The students were engrossed hearing the full story of how one family managed to survive the horrors of the period.














Science Gardening and Environment Team

Gardening gurus

It has been a busy year so far for the environmental group and recycling programs, here's an overview of what we've accomplished.

During form on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, Year 9, 10, 11 and 12 students are responsible for the school's paper, co-mingled and containers for change recycling at the school. This allows for the recycling of materials that would normally end up in general waste and landfill. Students are given a chance to take on leadership roles, problem solve and earn community service hours. The co-mingled, paper and containers for change bins located around the school are emptied by students every week, or twice very week to ensure that a smooth flow recycling is continued throughout the school.

In the past few years, the Environmental Group have been helping to restore Abbeybrook Reserve. Along with the help of the City of Stirling, students from all year groups have supported the rehabilitation process to provide Abbeybrook with a new start. Jobs include planting new seedlings to cleaning up and the team have done a wonderful job at restoring the natural world. Students have been busy weeding, planting and learning about the native species present in our bushland. The program doesn't end here as there is still a long way to go, and the team are all in for it!

The team has also been busy with planting within school. Every Friday at recess, keen students have been going over to the garden beds to help plant new seeds. With the help of environmentalist and teacher, Mr Barr, we have planted over 200 seeds to help the school. Students have been able to get involved, helping out the school and gaining experience in gardening and taking care of plants. It has been a great opportunity for students to meet like-minded people and spend their time out in the garden having fun.

In the first half of Term 2, the environmental group ran a fabric drive for teachers, allowing staff members to bring in old fabric that is unable to be put in charity bins. This was done through the PCCRW company in Perth that take old fabric from households, businesses, schools, etc. They then recycle this fabric in items such as rags for mechanical works. Students were in charge of communicating and organising with PCCRW and it was a huge success! We ended up with around 50 bags of fabric from various members of staff, saving significant amounts of textiles from landfill.

Science Year 10 AEP

Interdisciplinary Learning Project

Year 10 AEP English and HASS students participated in an Interdisciplinary Learning (IDL) project led by their teachers, Rochelle Coleman, Timothy Davies, Larissa Kool, John Carr and Susan Wilson.

What is an IDL? An IDL aims to foster collaborative skills amongst students, whilst bringing together their learning from two or more of their subjects. A key aim of this project is to provide students with an opportunity to develop and apply critical thinking skills and demonstrate their creativity. These skills will be valuable to students as they move into higher education, and then the world of work.

Our guest speaker, Isabella Choate was a highlight for the students in their preparation stage. As a previous Churchlands student, interim CEO for the Youth Disability Advocacy Network, and the WA Young Person of the Year in 2023, Isabella provided a rich insight into how to advocate and initiate change that is meaningful to the individual and society.

Students chose a project topic to answer the question "How can we be agents of change?". They proposed a change they would like to see, and researched historical events to discover how agents of change have brought about the desired outcome. Students have proposed a future change that they deem necessary, they justified the need and proposed strategies that will bring about the change.

These topics demonstrated a diverse range of interests including:

• Plant your apparel: a project focussing on overconsumption of clothing and the waste problems associated

• Y-AMP: a project looking at solutions for age and gender-based exploitation in the music industry

• You've been lied to: a project looking at news literacy in this clickbait and fake news era.

Parents and staff interrogated the learning of students using a set of questions we provided based around cognitive processes and group work.

These included:

• What have learned about how to work in a team that you could transfer to a real-life context?

• If someone else were looking at your project, what might they learn about who you are?

• What were some things your teammates did that helped you to learn or overcome obstacles?

The camp was to help these students connect with their culture as well as develop their leadership skills and become leaders in the school and wider community. The camp was run by Wula Gura Nyinda Eco Cultural Adventures and focussed on the five core values of leadership, teamwork, safety, communication, and respect. After a loooong bus ride, we stayed in Denham and had pizza for our "last meal" before heading into the bush. After dinner, our tour guide Capes and his niece Renae came to visit us at our accommodation and outline the expectations for the camp; giving up phones was a big concern for some!

On Monday morning, we set out bright and early in the Troopys and headed off for our private campsite at the edge of Big Lagoon. Talk about a waterfront home! We were sleeping in swags right on the beach in this beautiful World Heritage area. Most of the first day was spent setting up camp. Students showed incredible teamwork skills working together to set up the kitchen area and their swags, jumping in and helping others when needed. The girls learnt some stories about stars from Aunty Renae before heading back to camp.

Tuesday was spent kayaking and swimming. After revising the rules about safety and working together as a team, we set off on a group kayak to check out wildlife in the lagoon. We saw sharks, rays, and some lucky people spotted a green turtle! We then did some bushwalking in the dunes and spotted a fossil. Capes showed us how to find freshwater by digging in the dunes and everyone had a taste. We then jumped back on to our kayaks and headed back to camp for free time, dinner, and talking about the day. We also had to give examples of how we had shown the values of leadership, teamwork, safety, communication, and respect.

On Wednesday, we had a 4WD adventure in Francois Peron National Park, visiting Herald Bight, Skipjack Point, and Cape Peron. We learnt how to identify plants, ate bush tucker, hiked, swum, and snorkelled. We were lucky enough to see dugong feeding in the sea grass off the tip of Cape Peron! Upon return to camp, we had a late dinner and talked about our day and gave examples of the five values. We all had to state our traditional Aboriginal name before we could be served our dinner!

Thursday was our last full day and we were lucky enough to have a wildlife cruise with Perfect Nature Cruises. Despite the very windy weather and poor visibility in the water, we managed to see a dugong and some dolphins. Some students braved the cold and jumped in the ship's drag net on the way back to shore! To warm up, we visited the natural hot springs for a dip and some lunch. Of course, we had to celebrate Trevan's birthday (Year 7) with some chocolate cake and a gift of a shark tooth necklace from Capes and Renae. Afterwards, we returned to camp to start the pack up for the morning and have dinner. Our yarn before dinner was a big one; we talked about everything we had done and learnt, our Aboriginal names and some facts about them, and what we had got out of the camp. Students showed their leadership through public speaking in front of the group.

Friday morning was a rush to pack up the campsite to leave the environment as pristine as we found it. We made fairly quick work of it working together, but it still took us longer than expected. It was a very tired bunch of students and teachers who arrived back at school on Friday night, but all agreed that it was a great experience; even without their phones! The trip was very valuable to help the students develop their leadership skills and connect with their culture. Thanks to the generous support of the Churchlands Foundation for providing the funds to make this happen!
