Covid-19 Information

We continue to monitor the Covid-19 situation closely. The Department or Education (DoE) has mandated that all staff must be vaccinated before the start of the 2022 school year. In addition to this, adults who regularly attend schools will also need to be vaccinated. This includes trades people and workers on site and associated school support services. It does not apply to parents unless they have a role with the school. We will publish the requirements for this when they become available. Currently, the only requirement for students to be vaccinated is if they are undertaking a work placement at a business where it is a requirement to be vaccinated. We will work with our families to understand these requirements for students who are doing work experience.

In Term 1, Churchlands SHS welcomed Dr James Kent as the new Principal

Dr Kent offered a new perspective and a unique way of leading our school with a strong focus on the learning and extracurricular experiences our students are offered. He has been committed to building professional relationships with all members of the school community and has had a significant impact on both the Executive and Senior Leadership teams through a connection which he has built with all team members over the course of the year. Dr Kent took great delight in observing our teachers teach and would regularly comment on them as one of our greatest strengths. He was especially active in the yard during breaks and enjoyed engaging with our students, many of whom have expressed their appreciation for opportunity to converse with their Principal. Without exception, one of the highlights for Dr Kent this year was the high calibre of our students not only academically but also the value they bring to their wider community through the Community Service Program which resonates strongly with the personal values he would aim to instil.

Dr Kent commenced with the Department of Education in 1989 as a Mathematics teacher at Morawa District High School. Since then he has worked at Thornlie Senior High School, Tom Price Senior High School, Swan View Senior High School, Tuart College and Yanchep Secondary College and has held positions as Head of Department (Mathematics), Program Coordinator, Deputy Principal, Vice Principal and Principal. His first Principalship was at Yanchep Secondary College in 2017, followed by his appointment to Churchlands Senior High School commencing 2021. James has completed his Masters of Educational Leadership (1999) and Doctorate in Education (2006) at the University of Western Australia. His doctoral thesis was on developing an understanding of how mathematics teachers pass on their expertise and knowledge in class, and how this compared to student attitudes toward mathematics.

Dr Kent was recently selected to be the new substantive Principal at Ocean Reef Senior High School, with Mr Neil Hunt returning to his substantive role after providing leadership at the state level for the past year.


This year, on the last day of school, our cohort hopped on a bus and headed off to Whitford Shopping Centre for an extraordinary day of fun.

They broke down the stereotypes of what it is to be a man, addressed issues of toxic masculinity in a way that engaged the students. Inclusiveness was intrinsic in the messages and process of the program and they were subtly breaking down some of the stereotypes of toxic masculinity while acknowledging the identity of young men.







Try-A-Trade


16 students participated in Try-A-Trade at Joondalup TAFE in Term 3 and there was a second opportunity for this experience in Term 4. Sometimes our Year 9s can get a bit lost regarding direction and Try-A-Trade is a fantastic way to have students clarify their goals.

I observed greater engagement in school as a result of such an experience as they realise that they can begin their qualifications in the Trades starting in Year 10 with Certificate courses in Construction, for example, where students get a taste of fabrication, plastering, carpentry, tiling and bricklaying. The workplace is set up as a construction site so students do get to visualise what their career might look like and the type of learning environment they will be engaged in a few days a week as early as Year 10.

I was impressed with the bricklaying instructor, who had the student's instant attention when he talked about the industry. Should have seen the students eyes light up when they worked out that at current \$3/brick that they would walk away with \$30 000 in the pocket for an average brick home and with most companies doing around 20 constructions annually...?! I have never seen students do mental maths so quickly!! Please get your child involved in the Certificate Courses on offer at CSHS, if they are considering a career pathway in the trades or an alternative pathway to university.

We are proud of our Year 9s and we look forward to continuing to share in and celebrate their lives and achievements as they continue to "Aim High".





Year 11 Children, Family and Community: Virtual Baby Program

Part way through Term 4, the Home Economics department had a large delivery – the virtual babies! Each baby is approximately six weeks of age and 3.5kg. All funding was very kindly provided by the P&C. The packages contained a lot of items, all of which are pictured. We were lucky enough to be able to get one of each nationality of baby available. This includes light skinned African American, dark skinned African American, Caucasian, Native American and Hispanic.



With the babies come a lot of accessories. This includes two pregnancy vests which is to simulate seven months pregnancy.



We were also very fortunate to be able to get the demonstration babies pictured below. From left to right, we have the shaken baby syndrome baby, the drug affected baby and the foetal alcohol syndrome baby. These babies are used for demonstration and learning purposes only.



There are two new features of these babies we have not seen before. First, temperature sensitivity. Each baby will come with four outfits plus a muslin wrap – these are not just for show! Each outfit contains a sensor and when the baby cries, students will now have another check to do to see if they need an outfit change! In previous models, the baby did not have any temperature sensitivity and had only one outfit.

Year 9 AEP Coral Bay Camp

Last year, the Year 8 AEP cohort was left devastated when the annual Coral Bay Camp was cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

To make up for last year's disappointment, in Week 5 of this term 64 AEP students had the opportunity to head north to the Ningaloo region to learn more about its unique ecosystem and about ways we can adopt sustainable practices so that we might preserve these natural wonders for future generations to enjoy.



Over the five days we were in Coral Bay, we were able to experience swimming with manta rays,

snorkelling amongst the coral, swimming with sea scooters and sailing on a glass bottom boat. When not snorkelling, we were able to play volleyball at our



campsite, card games and even explore the town - or what little there was of it!

On the manta ray tour, we were lucky enough to witness and swim alongside a mating chain.

This chain consisted of three male manta rays dancing around in the ocean, following and mimicking the one female at the lead. They were so graceful, gliding through the water with ease and even turning around to smile at us as they floated



onto their backs, curious as to who we might be.

These magnificent creatures were enormous, with their wingspan being about 2m. This was definitely an experience that will be impossible to forget.

Another activity that we got to do a lot of was practice our snorkelling, even

swimming out to Ayer's Rock (named for its similarities with our national treasure, Uluru), an underwater rock formation filled with an abundance of coral and life. Here, schools of bright



blue fish the size of your finger swum, shimmering around us, and butterfly fish darted in and out of the coral. On other snorkelling adventures, we were also fortunate enough to see



heaps of turtles, reef sharks and even saw the 'lavender patch', a gorgeous stretch of purple coral, populated by fish every colour of the rainbow.

Apart from learning more about the natural ecosystem through our tour guides and our chats with the locals, we were also fortunate enough to

have Frazer, a local marine biologist, come to talk to us about the diverse Ningaloo system and how it is teeming with life, each organism playing a distinct and necessary role in keeping the ecosystem healthy. During this talk, we also learnt



more about human impacts on reef, and about how vital it is to adopt more sustainable practices to stop coral bleaching and preserve these natural wonders for future generations.

Towards the end of the trip, we were also able to go on a guided walk around the settlement to learn about its history and purpose. Braving the heat in the late afternoon, we were taken to see the emergency services buildings, the research lab and even a natural shark sanctuary, which is surrounded by a sacred Indigenous burial ground.

All the information we learnt from our AEP classes and tour guides led up to a debate that we had on our last day in Coral Bay. Trying to impress the teachers with our newfound knowledge and

our well-established critical thinking skills, we were each assigned a stakeholder group, (either those who were interested in using the natural resources specific to the region, the locals, the tourism industry or marine biologists) and had mini debates,



eventually coming to a decision as to whether offshore oil mining should be allowed in the region.

When it was time to come back to Perth we were all so sad, and even now we miss it (even the heat and flies). This camp not only taught us more about sustainability and the Ningaloo region, but it also helped us build new friendships and challenge ourselves. I know that if we were given an opportunity to go again, we would all jump at the chance!
