












From The Principal

As Term 1, 2017 draws to a close it is worth reflecting on and celebrating the many events and activities that took place in the past nine weeks.

Without doubt the social highlight of the year is the School Ball held on Friday March 17. This year's organiser tried out a new venue, the Crown Grand Ballroom which was extremely well received by both students and staff in attendance and is the likely venue for 2017, though this has yet to be confirmed. In the words of Mr Galvin: congratulations to our Year 12 students for their exemplary behaviour and fabulous turn out at their ball in the Crown Grand Ballroom. The ladies looked stunning in their elegant and flowing ball gowns and the gents equally epitomised the 'Classic Hollywood' theme looking dapper in their suits, some even in top hats and tails! I had quite a bit of trouble recognising a lot of our students, such was their mature display.

Throughout February the Phys Ed Department organised four separate House Swimming Carnivals form which they selected the Interschool Swimming team to do battle at Challenge Stadium on March 15. Our team swam its heart out but were just pipped at the post by Shenton College in a closely fought contest.

The Phys Ed Department was excited to take possession of the school's new sports hall mid-February. Featuring two magnificent basketball courts (soon to have installed video walls), new staff offices and loads of storage. The facility is second to none in WA schools.


During the term the school and the P & C held two successful functions aimed at welcoming new parents into the school. In the first week, the P & C hosted a sundowner for new and existing parents that was extremely well supported. The annual Year 7 BBQ was held on March 16 with an estimated 500 in attendance. Sponsored by the P & C, this gave Mr Dunn the opportunity to introduce key Year 7 personnel to parents, the P & C an opportunity to be heard and the Churchlands Foundation through Mr John Gillon presented the music scholarships. Mr Gillon took the opportunity to outline the Foundation's Solar panel project.

Academic activities were also to the fore during term one. OLNA (Online Literacy and Numeracy) testing took place during the week commencing March 7. These assessments are now critical to graduation requirements with several opportunities provided to students to meet the standards between Year 10 and Year 12. Year 11 students were, for the first time, introduced to the concept of rigorous testing during the first six weeks of term. The philosophy behind these tests is students need to be exposed to the standard required to succeed from the moment they commence Year 11. This process is also repeated in Year 12.

During the last week of term four we have four groups of students departing our shores for a range of countries in Europe and Asia. The tours to France and Japan are the first to depart on March 31. Students going to Japan will spend time in Tokyo before connecting with host families at our sister school in Akashi Nishi, while our French tourists will spend time in Paris and time with a new International partner, Sasserno High School which is located in Nice. The following day a further group of students depart for China, flying to Shanghai before travelling to Hangzhou where they will stay with host families. To complete their journey the tour will spend its final days in Beijing. The Ancient History tour flies to Athens where a range of famous sites are available to visit. The tour takes in such exotic locations as Crete, Santorini, Tolo and Delphi and will be an incredible experience for these students.

The next big event is the school's annual production. With a cast of around one hundred students, Mrs Sutherland, Mrs Padley ad Mr Sealey have put in long hours to have the musical ready for the second week of next term. More information to follow on this.

This Transition program has begun with Careers Advisor Mrs Clare Slodecki visiting Humanities classes to conduct the Career Voyage which is the first step in encouraging students to start thinking about their future educational and career pathways.

Year 11 Report

Term 1 has held many challenges for Year 11 students

They have had to make decisions about their learning and many have been challenged by the rigour of assessments thus building resilience. The introduction of Good Standing has added a level of responsibility required for senior school that is accepted and appreciated by the majority of senior students. There are new leadership opportunities that will arise as we form committees required for the various activities in Year 12 including the School Ball committee and Leavers' Jacket committee.

Many students are showing great maturity in balancing study, high level sport/arts/community/music and part time work commitments. Students should keep reviewing the balance of these commitments and use the support network of subject teachers, Form teachers, House Coordinators, Mr Tomlin and Mr Housley to assist them with challenging decisions.

Parents are advised to use SEQTA Engage to monitor assignments, tests and results. Awareness and planning are a big part of success and we expect that this information will enable parents to assist their children with homework and the management of stress. Time Management

Alpha Motivation also offered four main key elements for successful time management skills. These elements are listed in order from finding time, prioritizing, reducing work and doing the work.

From the Psychologists

What Do You Do To Keep Your Brain Fit?

We spend a lot of time trying to be healthy by eating well and keeping fit, however what do we do to keep our brain healthy? A healthy brain helps us to perform at our very best, stay focused and engaged, all of which helps us to feel more confident and happy. Most of all this builds our resilience so we can better deal with stressful situations and life events. Following are five suggestions for ways to look after your brain:

- 1. Sleep Well If our brain is fatigued we can't concentrate, struggle to absorb new information or solve problems, make mistakes and our mood is affected we become grumpy and our mood drops. Maintaining a healthy sleep habit is vital for our brains and helps prevent the above as well as helping with our learning process in particular with storing information in our long-term memory. Remember research tells us that adolescents need to get 8 1/2 to 9 1/2 hours of sleep each night!
- 2. Feed Your Brain For our brains to work efficiently and at their best, it is important that no meals are skipped! Ensure meals are healthy and include fresh and unprocessed foods (fruit and vegetables). Remember to also hydrate your brain this helps with our ability to focus and concentrate and stay motivated on the task at hand.



- 3. Exercise At least thirty minutes of aerobic exercise helps our brain to perform at its best. Exercise produces various neurochemicals including BDNF (Brain Derived Neurotrophic Factor) which support neuronal health and function. Exercise will also boost our attention and thought processes.
- 4. Schedule Breaks For Your Brain Our brain slows down if we have been working it for too long. It is important to schedule short five to ten minute breaks into homework /study routines. (Work for forty to fourty five minutes minutes with a five to ten minute break) If you do this your brain will be able to absorb information and get the tasks done more quickly and efficiently.

5. Slow Down And Give Your Brain Some Time-Out – Life has become extremely busy and with modern technology taking up a lot of our 'spare' time our brains have little down time. Foggy and muddled thinking can result which then leads to decreased ability to solve problems,



think clearly and creatively and make good decisions. Take some time daily to give your brain time to slow down and pause – this can be done by practicing breathing exercises or Mindfulness and Meditation for twenty minutes a day. Some great Apps that are free include 'The Smiling Mind' and 'Breathe' by ReachOut.com.



I thought it would be nice to send you an update on what is happening here in Norway and what I've done so far. I am having a fantastic time in this country and have many things to look forward to.

When I first arrived in Norway it was very gloomy, with the sky filled with grey clouds and very little snow on the ground. It is starting to warm up now and the fog has almost gone. The days are getting lighter very quickly and in two weeks we start daylight savings.



These two pictures are taken from Nesøya, the island on which I live. The top was taken early morning and the bottom was taken during my walk home from school. Norway is so beautiful when the sun is out as everything shines! The people are also more joyful when the sun comes out. Nesøya has a population of just under 5000 people and is very close to Oslo, twenty minute bus ride. It has (very) small beaches all along the sides of the island and in the middle, there is a forest which deer live in.

My host-family are incredible people, they are so nice and always have something to do. My family looks after a dog which has been very exciting for me as I have always wanted a dog!

It has been a bit slow learning Norwegian as I was originally placed into an IB program at my school (international baccalaureate). However, because all the students spoke English during class and breaks I

could make lots of new friends quickly, as there was no language barrier to break. I have now been able to move into some Norwegian classes including History, psychology, economics and Norsk (and I am doing Chemistry and more Norwegian in IB still). Because I have swapped from IB to Norwegian, almost every day I have more than an hour for lunch, which gives me plenty of time to relax, get any school work done and practice Norwegian.

School is very different here compared to school in Australia. There are no school uniforms or bells to tell you when lunch is up, and people use their phones in class and talk whilst the teacher is teaching. It is extremely informal, and the students call their teacher by their first name, which still feels weird to me.

I have joined a local band and have been given a cornet to practice on. They rehearse once a week, and have a concert next month with one of Norway's well known singers who took part in Eurovision. Every year they do a concert tour around a country so I might be lucky enough to go to Sweden or another trip around Norway. At the moment, I am not playing any sports but might join a swim club or other sport club soon.

Winter camp was a couple of weeks ago, where all the exchange students first met. We stayed in cabins in a place called Nesbyen, very close to ski slopes for alpine skiing. We learnt how to cross country ski and were given a taste of alpine skiing. We also visited an animal park in which we got to feed moose, artic foxes, reindeer, wolves, and cuddle baby goats. One of the nights we ate a traditional Norwegian dinner inside a tee-pee whilst sitting on reindeer fur around a fire, I'm sure there is a proper name for the building. Each of the cabins we were staying in had a sauna, so most nights consisted of running back and from sauna and snow followed by long sits in front of the fire place.

After winter camp I joined my family at Hemsedal (one hour drive away) for more skiing. They own a holiday home up on one of the mountains, so from the kitchen there is a stunning view of the ski slopes. During winter holidays my family also went up to Hemsedal. Every day we went on a cross country ski trek, so all up I have skied seventy five kilometre! Once you have reached one hundred kilometre it is possible to send that count into the government and they send you a ski pin back, so between now and Easter, when the snow melts, I'm hoping to get in another twenty five kilometre.

Two weeks ago I gave my presentation to the Rotary Club of Sandvika. All the Rotarians were very interested in Australian culture and I received numerous questions about our deadly animals and waters. Because their rotary club meets 6pm at nights I thought it would be nice to provide a sample of Australian cuisine, including some cakes, slices, biscuits, and vegemite. What was most surprising was that almost all the Rotarians had tried vegemite, and went back for seconds, layering it on thick.

This past weekends have been quite busy. I went to see a typical Norwegian school play with some of the people from Nesbru (my school). I met up with some of the exchange students in Oslo and went sightseeing around the tourist spots and catching up since winter camp, and was also fortunate enough to be invited to a concert.

The Holmenkollen camp was the last weekend, the second official catchup with all the other rotary students. We visited the ski museum and learnt how skis have developed since the 1800s and before, Fram museum where we got to go on the original ship which took Fram's crew to the North Pole and first successful expedition to the conquer the South Pole, Viking museum where the oldest real Viking ship remains are, maritime museum, and the Nobel peace prize center. On the Sunday, we were at the Holmenkollen ski event the whole day watching women's cross country and men's ski jumping. It is incredible how people can throw themselves down a huge ramp and fly hundreds of meters through the air.

This weekend I will be travelling to Geneva with twenty of my class mates for a science trip to visit a local school, science labs, the UN headquarters and the Hadron collider, a particle accelerator.

Thank you for giving me this incredible opportunity to live in Norway for a year. I am trying to make the most of every opportunity and soak up all the culture.

Since it was conceived in 1958, Rotary Youth Exchange has become one of Rotary's respected programs. Today there are between 8000-9000 exchanges arranged each year around the world, these exchanges allow students from around about eighty countries of the Rotary world the opportunity of a life time to develop international friendships and learn about a different culture and the need for understanding of each other's culture.

Churchlands for many years (over fifteen years) has been a part of the program hosting and educating foreign exchange students from numerous countries thus being part of building a family of international exchange and friendship.

Our students have enjoyed a range of engaging activities both inside and outside of the classroom to start 2017. We continue to provide innovative and enjoyable educational learning activities across all lower and upper school classes. Here is just a snippet of what's been happening in Term One.

Water Corporation Incursion

On the 20th and 23rd of February, an education officer from the Water Corporation spoke to all of the Year 7 HASS classes about Perth's water supply. We had been learning about the water cycle, supplies in certain countries and impacts humans can have on the cycle. Meghan explained to the Year 7s that WA is using new methods to produce fresh water such as desalination plants. This is because less water is flowing into the dams and Perth is needing more water than ever because of a population increase.

What I came out with was that Perth's dams are a lot lower than they used to be. This is because rainfall is much lower than what it was ten years ago. 
STEM Expands at Churchlands

STEM X Academy Training



Churchlands SHS Science Teacher, Dr Grant Pusey spent a week of the school holidays in Canberra at the STEM X Academy

STEM X Academy is a National teacher development program run by the Australian Science Teachers Association (ASTA) and Dr Pusey was one of just thirty five secondary teachers across the country selected to attend.

During his week in Canberra, Dr Pusey worked with high calibre secondary school teachers from around the country to come up with fresh ideas for Science and STEM teaching. The main focus of the program is the development of exciting, hands-on, enquiry based lessons and activities using easily accessible resources. Science in the 21st century does not work in isolation and STEM X believes neither should teachers. The outcome is a dynamic network that is sharing ideas, resources, experience, encouragement and engagement with innovative teaching tools that are relevant to the world of science today.

Dr Pusey met with lead researchers in Science and Technology, and visited top facilities including CSIRO, Questacon, Parliament House, Mount Stromlo Observatory, NASA Deep Space Complex, Canberra Arboretum and the Botanical Gardens, Exposure to scientific laboratories, museums and researchers inspired ideas among the teachers who worked daily to develop, collate and share new strategies to take back to their schools. Together with the other participants, Dr Pusey developed a series of activities to bring back to Churchlands to make the curriculum more dynamic, exciting and authentic for our students.




Robotics














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
