

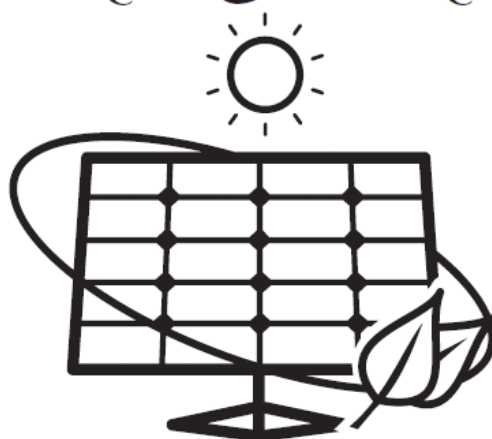

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From The Principal



As Churchlands continues to grow I have noticed how my role as school leader is constantly changing

For a period leading up to 2010 I taught a Year 10 Mathematics class which enabled me to keep in touch with students and classroom procedures. When we became an independent public school in 2011, the administration re-structure that I implemented meant that I would no longer have time to take a class due to a significant increase in workload. One of my new tasks was to take control of the school's human resources for the period 2011 to 2015. The benefit of this was that I was in regular contact with and easily accessible to both teaching and non-teaching staff which brought with it significant interpersonal advantages. The appointment of a Deputy Principal to manage Human Resources from the commencement of 2016 has been very positive but, consequently, has disconnected me from staff. I must admit that our work force management processes now far exceed that which I was able to manage during this period.

The positives for the school is that I now have greater opportunity to consider educational research and, where appropriate, engage in the provision of further training and development of my senior and middle management teams to inform classroom practice. The following provides some ideas into the research that I am currently considering.

Currently Professor John Hattie is considered Australia's foremost educational researcher both nationally and internationally. Collaborating with colleagues around the globe, he has established the Visible Learning Database which is made up of 1200 meta-analyses taken from over 300 million students. A meta-analysis is a statistical tool for combining findings from different studies with the goal of identifying patterns which can inform practice. In other words, they are studies of studies. From this, every aspect that could influence student learning is given an "effect size". Hattie has aggregated this information such that an effect size of 0.4 represents learning at an appropriate rate, meaning a year of educational growth for a year spent at school.

Given his research data is now accepted world-wide it is interesting to consider non-educator adult perceptions around what is important when various influences on education are considered. Of 1004 parents surveyed as part of the ABC's Revolution School, parents considered the following had the greatest influence on a child's learning:

- Smaller class sizes- 91%
- Extra curricula tuition- 76%
- Enforcing Homework – 71%
- Religious orientation – 70%
- School uniform – 66%
- Private school - 56%
- Single sex – 49%

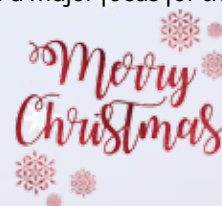
Hattie's data shows that none of the above have an effect size greater than 0.4 meaning they may not be considered essential to improving student learning, yet they tend to dominate discussion politically and industrially. We need to use his research to inform our practice and focus on addressing those influences that have the greatest impact on student learning, not what is newsworthy.

In his latest Effect Size Ranking published in 2015, the three greatest influences on student achievement are Teacher Expectation, Teacher Collective Efficacy (which is developed through Collaboration) and Student Expectation. Other high effect sizes include Feedback, Formative Evaluation, Higher Order Thinking Skills and Classroom Discussion.

Throughout 2016, Churchlands has maintained its focus on our instructional strategies programs and we have expanded this to include teachers collaborating through viewing each other teach, formalising the development of Instructional leaders at middle management level and expanding teachers understanding of Visible Thinking and Learning.

The development of our recent Business Plan 2017 – 2019 has the above as a major focus for the next three years.

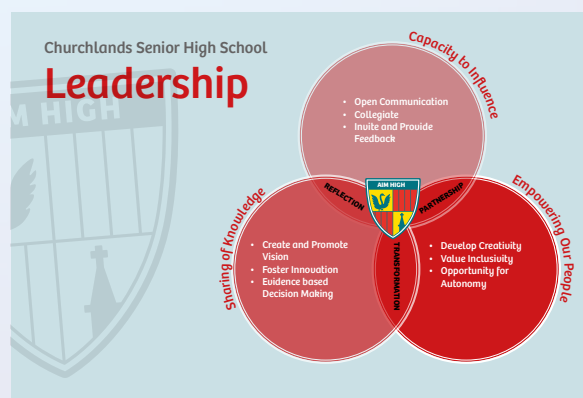

Student Leadership Camp and You Can Sit With Me Program

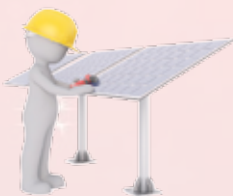

News from World Vision Sponsored Children

I am delighted to report that we have had communication from two of our four sponsor children and World Vision have told us that something is in the pipeline from Uganda – given the location and the nature of the issues facing these communities, mail from either of our students to Africa, or communication from our sponsor children could take quite some time. At the moment, some of our Student Councillors are in the process of creating a noticeboard on which we can display any letters and photographs we receive, but I am pleased that we are able to include copies of the letters which have recently arrived. As the girls are both very young, Laxmmi's aunty has written a letter on her behalf, which was translated by World Vision staff, while Huoy Y told a school student in the village what she wanted him to write for her and this has been translated so our students can read it. We are now really keen to hear from Solomon and Mebhrit. The student councillors are already composing replies to Laxmmi and Huoy Y and have decided to get the ball rolling by writing to the boys, in case they are waiting to hear from us! We are also about to send off Christmas cards and have enough money in the kitty to add a small Christmas gift to their respective villages through World Vision's gift giving program.

Dear Sponsor, Greetings. Laxmmi lives with her parents. She loves to eat vegetables and khichadi (a dish made up of rice and pulses). She loves to play with toys and goats. Laxmmi enjoys drinking milk. Her father cultivates vegetables. Our village is full of lush green fields.

Child: Huoy Y
Dear Sponsor, My name is Huoy Y. I want to become a teacher. Around my house has coconut tree, mango tree, guava. I have cow, pig, chicken, duck, dog, cat. I like strawberry. I like red. I like to play toy house. Finally I wish you healthy.

On that subject, we have once again decided to do a Form class challenge to purchase Christmas gifts through World Vision, but I am, as yet, unable to tell you what gifts we are providing, as at the time of writing, the deadline for contributions has not yet happened. I am sure we will be able to buy a substantial amount again this year. In the true spirit of Christmas, we are also doing our Salvo's Christmas collection, for which we ask as many students as possible to bring an item of food (does not have to be related to Christmas), or a small gift, or Christmas related item such as wrapping paper or Christmas crackers. Representatives of the Salvos collect and distribute our donations to individual families or use it for the Christmas lunch they hold each year for the homeless or the lonely. We have really become a generous school and I am pleased that the majority of our students realise how lucky they are and therefore are prepared to help those less fortunate.

Other Volunteer Services

As for other volunteer matters, we have continued to support a range of local schools and community groups where we can. Next year, I will be actively seeking more opportunities for our students, firstly through more of our feeder primary schools. This year we have again had students coaching netball at Woodlands PS, marshalling at Gwelup PS and Wembley PS Fun Runs, coaching the running club students at Yuluma PS; in addition, Kapinara PS called for volunteers to assist the P&C with a fundraising Quiz Night and also with a fundraiser on Election Day and we have also had a group of volunteers assist at Scarborough PS's Twilight Market. Students have also been engaged in decal and T-Shirt printing, as well as 3D design prototyping using the 3D printers.

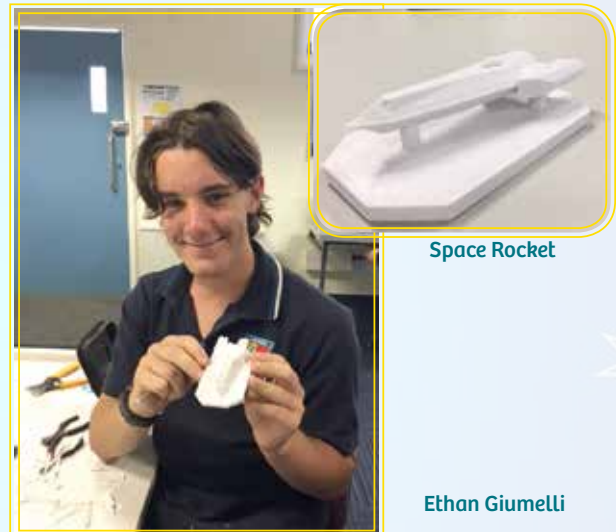
Next year the Technology Department will see more students attending this club as we hope to incorporate sublimation T shirt design, coffee mug design, watch design and drone technology.

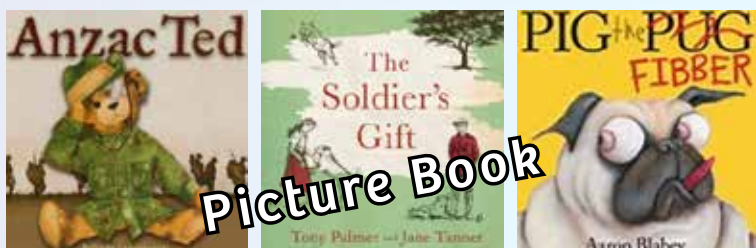
West Australian Young Readers' Book Award 2016

Australian Indigenous Mentoring Experience (AIME)

Year 7 and 8s

Our Year 7 and 8 Aboriginal students attended their first AIME day this term in Week 7. What a great day they had. An inspiring day for the students, it allowed them to demonstrate their value in learning and how school can unlock their potential. Whilst there the students broke out in to their year groups and enjoyed learning and mentoring opportunities with the AIME staff and mentors. These included sessions such as 'Seize the Power' and the 'Game of Life'.

After lunch Jayden Gerrand from AIME provided the students with a cultural tour of Kurongkurl Katitjin Centre. On this tour the students were shown a grass tree that was 175 years old. They also learnt that if you were in the bush and you no longer saw grass trees you were no longer on Noongar land. They learnt about the six Noongar seasons which are determined by the weather patterns. The seasons tells us which animal and plant resources are plentiful.

Birak – December and January, the first summer
Bunuru – February and March, the second summer
Djeran – April and May, autumn
Makuru – June and July, the first rains
Djilba – August and September, the second rains
Kambarang – October and November, the wildflower season

Year 9 and 10s

Our Year 9 and 10 AIME students attended their end of year celebrations. The first session was an amazing cultural enrichment activity that provided the students with language and information about traditional tools and ceremony. The students also had a great interactive music and dance session with Beni Bjah. They then broke out in to year groups to explore the historical timeline in which indigenous people fought for their rights. The students then reflected on goals they had previously set. The end of the day was celebrated with a graduation ceremony and Lakoya was awarded with an AIME art internship award.

'YOU CAN SIT WITH ME' Anti-Bullying Kindness Campaign

In 2017 the *YOU CAN SIT WITH ME* anti-bullying initiative and kindness campaign will be run at Churchlands. The initiative supports students suffering with anxiety, depression and feelings of isolation or anyone who is feeling lost or isolated during recess and lunchtimes.

YOU CAN SIT WITH ME aims to bring communities together with kindness and stamp out bullying with five simple words – **You can sit with me.**

Students who wear a band identify themselves as a safe harbour, someone others can approach if they are struggling in any way. Students know that anyone who wears a band will include them and say 'Hi, of course you can sit with me'.



Initially there will be seventy Year 10 students who have volunteered to wear the highly visible yellow wristbands with the words *YOU CAN SIT WITH ME* on them. Students who choose to take a wristband make themselves visible at recess and lunchtimes to anyone who needs a friendly face.

There will also be twenty students each from Year 7, 8 and 9 who will be selected by their House Coordinators who will also wear the wristbands, providing leadership roles for lower and middle school students.

Students will agree to wear the band for the day and earn one hour towards their community service hours.

Churchlands Peer Tutoring

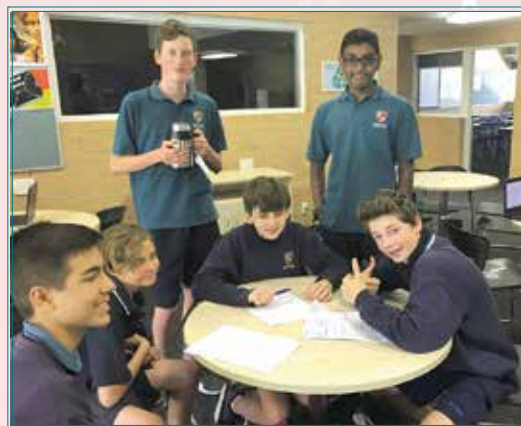

Congratulations to Meg

Further to our last newsletter we have obtained some extra information from Megan Stephens in Year 11 regarding her solo English Channel Swim.



To her knowledge Megan is the youngest swimmer from WA ever to have completed the English Channel solo and the first student from Churchlands Senior High school.

Megan left WA in July 2016 and met up with Sally Minty-Gravett (an experienced open water swimmer and solo Channel Swimmer) in Jersey, UK to gain some valuable tips on English Channel swimming. The plan was for

Sally to be on the same boat as Megan for her swim but due to bad weather conditions over a number of weeks this unfortunately did not eventuate on her first attempt.

Megan had to maintain training and momentum and wait another four weeks before favourable weather conditions finally gave her the 'green light' to try again. At 11pm on 18 August, she left from Samphire Hoe Beach in the UK for attempt number two. Megan swam through the night in fairly calm conditions. Three hours in to the swim a shoulder injury started to fatigue her, she pushed through the discomfort but was unable to swallow Neurofen whilst swimming even when it was administered to her in a marshmallow! From that point on she found it difficult to eat or drink anything due to vomiting. Her Dad, friends from Melbourne and observers on the support boat all had to keep a keen eye on Megan's health throughout the swim.

Twelve hours and one minute later Megan successfully completed her solo English Channel Swim finishing at Cap Gris-Nez beach at 11am. A group of approximately forty local people dining in the restaurant 'La Sirene'

cheered her arrival. The restaurant owner, Jean Francois brought her a traditional congratulatory glass of champagne (which is legal in France!). The landing was especially significant because there is only a tiny 0.00012% chance of landing on this exact two metre stretch of coastline. What a way to finish!



On completing the swim Megan said that finishing the swim, with the magnitude of the organisation and training that had taken place had changed her perspective on many things. She was surprised and happy not only at her own personal achievement but took great delight in sharing the success of many other swimmers who had also overcome both physical and mental challenges in completing the arduous challenge. Many wonderful friendships were formed with other swimmers from all over the world.



Meg is also a recent recipient of the Pierre de Coubertin award - an award that embraces the 'Spirit of Olympism'.
